

Our teen missionaries enjoyed reading to the students and listening to the students read to them. It was a wonderful day of sharing with our sister parish!




#### Fr. Joe Lukaszewski "Walk of Life"

# **Harmony and Peace**

This is an article I really don't want to write. I don't like controversy. In fact I detest it! I hate to be the one who 'stirs the pot'. Depending on the school of thought you subscribe to, I could be labeled a 'co-dependent'....I prefer to think of myself as a 'co-dependent in recovery'-sounds more hopeful. Peace at all costs...I can't help it. My sunsign is Libra and we like the scales to be balanced-harmony and peace is my motivating drive! Can't we all just get along?!!!



I want to update everyone on a story I wrote in March. This is the story of the woman with the four children. She came to the office on a rainy day and was actually waiting for Outreach to open. Two of the children were home from school that day with coughs and she had no money for cough medicine. She also needed money for diapers for the baby. This young mother of four sat in the rocking chair in our office and cried. Even on a good day, one can be overwhelmed being a mother! Never mind on a cold rainy day with two sick children and no money for medicine and diapers.

What I am going to tell you is not a 'warm and fuzzy'-but I do write this with this mother's permission. This follow-up is written after much prayer and soul-searching about my motives. It is written with the realization that this is the reality of many, countless women who make the choice for life.

What I didn't write in March was that part of this woman's sadness was related to her infant. She told me in March that she was thinking of placing the baby with an agency so the baby could be adopted. That having the fourth child was too much, but what could she do? What kind of mother was she? Having a child and then not being able to care for that baby. A flood of self-recrimination and grief and sadness.

At the end of June, this mother came in for diapers and food. We had received a donation of baby food which she gratefully accepted. And, as in March, she sat in our rocking chair and cried. This time, through her tears she told me when she was pregnant with this baby, she made an appointment at a clinic. She had decided to terminate the pregnancy. She kept the appointment and was all prepped for the procedure. As the doctor was about to begin, she stopped him. She said she couldn't go through with this, that it just wasn't right. She continues to cry. "Believe me, I'm not a person who takes. When I was working, I would donate and help others. I never thought that I would have to come and ask for help like this. I think I did the right thing. Sometimes, it is just so hard."

We pray each week for the unborn. We pray that our government will respect life in all its forms. I wonder is prayer enough? If that is all we do, then our prayer is sterile and removed from the realities of life. I am reminded of the Gospel story of the old widow who pulled from her purse her last coin to help the poor and needy. She quietly gave while the wealthy made a great showing of their generosity. Are our prayers a great show? Or are we like the poor widow who backs up belief with action.

I just wish for harmony and peace!

# **Sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time**

At a Thanksgiving Mass in a suburban Chicago parish last year, the children's choir stood to lead the congregation in the opening hymn, their only part for the day. As they began their first few notes, though, the organist, the adult choir, and a brass section joined in to "help" them, effectively drowning out their angelic little voices. A great deal of preparation and rehearsal by adults erased a simple gift of a musical prayer by children.

Martha and Mary were honored and humbled to have Jesus visit their home. As was the custom of the day, the rabbi or master was seated and waited on as a person of honor. Mary sat at Jesus' feet, willing to do whatever he may have asked. Martha, however, was caught up in the preparation and the details of making the visit more comfortable. Yet it was Mary in her simple devotion that touched Jesus the most.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church reminds us that God leads us all in ways that are pleasing to him, and we as believers respond as our hearts tell us to. (CCC 2699) Martha was not wrong in recognizing the importance of her visitor and making him comfortable, but Jesus felt compelled to point out that she, and we, should not let the distractions of life around us interfere with our focus on living as children of God.

# Relying Upon Instinct - LISTEN

"What I did on my Summer Vacation..." it's a bit involved but I do have a point.

We weren't ten minutes into our 12-hour drive before he started. And he remained relentless, to the point of annoyance, and was very worthy of my, "Enough already; knock it off," admonishment. This was our summer beach vacation.

Our family has been "beaching" since our daughter was 3 and our son 14 months. Both children are strong swimmers, understand and respect the ocean, and know the limits of how far to swim out. They have fun—cautiously. In fact, I was really looking forward to a more relaxing time now that they are young teens. Not this year. "You know you have to really watch them in the water," my husband began moments into our trip. "Don't take your eyes off of them for a minute; you never know what can happen." "The water is very unpredictable; they really do need to be watched," he continued well into our arrival and unpacking. He even got on the computer at the beach house to print off warnings and instructions regarding rip currents and made me sit down so that he could give me a tutorial.

What the heck? He's never behaved this way before, never neurotic and unglued about watching them in the water. Don't get me wrong, we've always kept a watchful eye, but this nagging was really over-the-top.

Vacation: day two, time to relax. I stuff myself into my Miracle Suitä, and we all plod down to the beach. Both kids ran ahead bounding into the water with their boogie boards, and I strategically placed my chair at water's edge far enough away from the little one's playing with, and occasionally throwing, sand.

Mr. Eagle-eye, "gotta watch the water" stayed farther back, expertly scanning the ocean for what he believed was impending danger. Fine! If he wants to ruin his time being irrational, that's his problem not mine. Humph!

An hour or so passed then whoosh—sand all over my book, my chair, and me. Who would be so rude? Out of the corner of my left eye I caught the blur of orange swim trunks as they raced into the ocean. It was this blur of orange that kicked sand all over me. Hey, just a minute, my husband has orange trunks!

Adjusting my sunglasses I see that it IS him diving into the waves and swimming as quickly as possible to get out past where they were breaking.

At water's edge were a man and woman, frantic. Others gathered trying to figure out what was happening. Beyond the waves I spotted a young girl's head bobbing up and down, more down than up. As she went down again my husband reached her, scooped her up and body-surfed a series of waves to get them both to shore.

His obsession with watching the water was no longer a mystery—it wasn't our children he was meant to be looking out for. All along, the nagging, the fuss, and yapping weren't for the benefit of our children but for another. These were messages sent by the Holy Spirit, a Holy Spirit that was hoping he would listen. How many times do we "hear" the Holy Spirit? Do we recognize the persistent feelings of God trying to communicate? Or do we allow others to talk us out of feeling the way we do (thank goodness my husband didn't listen to me as I repeated, "enough already, knock it off!")

Do you "hear" or sense over and over again a notion or call to action? Or do you work very hard to push it out of your mind? Try looking at it differently. Maybe you've been chosen to be an instrument of God, chosen to listen and act, or to communicate a concern.

The girl ran to her parents. My husband, trying very hard to look as if he wasn't in need of oxygen and resuscitation nonchalantly got out of the water embarrassed by people back-slapping and thanking him, uncomfortable with the girl's father giving him an embrace. I, of course, was dumbfounded—who knew he could move so fast? Mostly, however, I was amazed by the awesomeness of the experience—knowing the background of his premonition.

And as an aside, he never once mentioned watching the water again the entire week and wasn't vigilant about doing so. After this incident it was completely gone.

Oh, and the telling him he was an instrument of Godbad move. Now when we bicker he reminds me, "Tsk, tsk, tsk, remember I'm an instrument of God; may not want to mess with me." Jeesh!

LISTEN! Constant goading and prompting that won't go away is the Holy Spirit calling you to action—maybe to pick up the phone and call someone because they keep "popping" into your mind, or to take a chance and make a career move OR to communicate your concern when you suspect a child might be in danger.

It just gets so darn frustrating when people don't listen.

# Our Struggle with Envy

Why do we struggle with the things we struggle with? What explains us to ourselves? The bible begins with a series of stories that try to give reasons for the human condition. We're pretty familiar with one of these, Adam and Eve eating the apple, but less familiar with the story that follows immediately it.

The second such story on the human-condition is the one on Cain and Abel and it might be told this way: Once upon a time, two children are born. The older is Abel and everything about him is right. The sun itself seems to shine through his body, his talents, his temperament. Born just when his mum and dad most want a child, he never disappoints them, or anyone else. Love and good-cheer seemed to surround him and he succeeds effortlessly at everything he tries. The smoke of his sacrifice goes naturally upwards.

Then you are born! Right from day one things aren't right. Your parents aren't in a good space when they conceive you, your delivery is long and difficult, you are a sickly, difficult baby which is only a signal of things to come: Most everything about you is a disappointment - your arrival, your physical appearance, your grades at school, your disposition. Whatever you do somehow isn't enough, The smoke from your sacrifice never seems to go heavenward.

Eventually your failures, forever seen in the shadow of Abel's light, overcome you. You become bitter and resentful and lash out at Abel, trying to tear away his goodness, even as everyone around you sees the bitterness and envy in your eyes and begins to avoid you because of this. That further stigmatization, unspoken but always present, causes still a deeper loneliness and resentfulness. You become Cain.

Few of us admit to being jealous. Jealousy, we believe, is too petty a thing, something beneath our dignity, Yet jealousy is one of the most pervasive and destructive forces on the planet, more deeply engrained in all of us than we ever have the courage to admit. It's no accident that, among the ten commandments, jealousy gets two commandments, while murder and adultery have only one each. It's no accident either that the Gospels see satan and the devil as working primarily through envy (the devil by using it to divide people from each other and thus dissipate families and communities, and satan by using it to bring about the kind of

mob-madness that leads to crucifixions). Envy is one of the classic, seven deadly sins. It deserves its place on that lofty list. None of us are immune to it. The stigma of Cain marks us all.

What does that stigma look like? Jealousy rarely calls itself by its real name. It shows itself in us rather as bitterness, as hyper-criticalness, as the incapacity to praise someone else, as a congenital blockage that prevents us from truly rejoicing in others' good fortune, as an incapacity to feel the same empathy for the fortunate as for the unfortunate, as an unacknowledged sense of relief when a celebrity falls from grace, as a feeling of being cheated on by life itself, and as a restlessness that makes our own lives always too small and asphyxiating. That's what envy looks like. That is the mark of Cain.

And it's too a huge, huge hurtle in the spiritual life. Why?

Scripture tells us that in heaven we will stand before the throne of God to "offer unending praise". That's going to be rather difficult, given that we had very little practice in praising anything or anybody on this side of eternity. Simply put, if I go through life habitually bitter, over-critical, and resentful for the way things have turned out, how do I suddenly stop that anger of Cain inside me and begin to rejoice in the wonder and beauty of what's other? How do I admire beauty rather than try to possess it? Difficult, but that's precisely the task.

One of the major spiritual tasks, from mid-life onwards, is to come to grips with the bitterness that comes from envy, so as to move from criticism to praise, from bitterness to mellowness, from the desire to possess to the desire to admire. That's not an easy journey.

To move towards the day when we can "offer unending praise" involves acknowledging our jealousy and bitterness, grieving our less-than-perfect lives, moving beyond the sophistication of a culture that tells us to praise nothing, and, most important of all, it involves forgiving: We need to forgive ourselves, our parents, our culture, our church, our teachers, our mentors, those who have wounded us, life itself, and God Himself for the state of things and the state of our lives. Otherwise we will die as we live, harbouring bitterness, threatened by others's good fortune, wanting to possess what isn't ours, more easily speaking words of criticism than of admiration, and not having had sufficient practice in what constitutes eternal life, namely, "offering endless praise".







