Not sure what to do for Lent?

Are you ready for something new and meaningful? Let us show you the way!

Come and experience what Isaiah, the prophet, described as a fast that is pleasing to God.

Here is what Isaiah said...

Would that today you might fast so as to make your voice heard on high! Is this the manner of fasting I wish, of keeping a day of penance: That a man bow his head like a reed and lie in sackcloth and ashes? Do you call this a fast, a day acceptable to the LORD? This, rather, is the fasting that I wish: releasing those bound unjustly, untying the thongs of the yoke; Setting free the oppressed, breaking every yoke; Sharing your bread with the hungry, sheltering the oppressed and the homeless; Clothing the naked when you see them, and not turning your back on your own. Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your wound shall quickly be healed; Your vindication shall go before you, and the glory of the LORD shall be your rear guard.

Then you shall call, and the LORD will answer, you shall cry for help, and he will say:
Here I am!

Here is the invitation...

We invite you and your family to take upon yourself a simpler way of life – the life lived by millions who suffer poverty and low income.

We invite you to live on a food stamp budget for one week—a minimal amount barely sufficient for basic needs.

In this way we invite you to experience life as the poor and needy do each day.

Why is it pleasing to God?

We will invite you in your own way and in your own time to use the time, the energy, the money you save to benefit someone who is truly needy through our outreach program.

In this way your fast will be the giving up of what someone else needs.

Guidelines for OLL Lenten Food Stamp Fast

Sunday, March 2 - Sunday, March 9

All participants will be invited to begin their week of fasting with a blessing at mass on the weekend of **March 1/2.** The blessing will be given at all masses that weekend and will officially begin our week of fasting in solidarity with the poor. We ask that, as much as is possible, you observe the following guidelines. Participating in the fast is symbolic, and we recognize that some may not be able to keep to the guidelines exactly (especially where there are health concerns, etc.) It is the spirit of the fast that is important, rather than how well you adhere to individual guidelines below. Let's spend the week mindful of those who do not have choices as we do.

Participation Guidelines

- 1. The Food Stamp budget is approximately \$21 per person per week. Since those on food stamps might also receive some other assistance, we will also add:
 a) a \$40 allotment per family to buy staples only (rice, canned food, etc.) as these are items a needy family would receive from a food pantry or outreach center.
 b) If there are children in your household add \$10 per child per week since school children often receive a federal free lunch program.
- 2. All food purchased and eaten during the Challenge week, including fast food and dining out must be included in the total spending.
- 3. During the Challenge, only eat food that you purchase for the project. Do not eat food that you already own (this does *not* include spices and condiments).
- 4. Avoid accepting free food from friends, family or at work.
- 5. Since part of a typical food stamp recipient's week might include a visit to a soup kitchen, you will be invited to a Soup Supper at OLL on Wednesday, March 5 at 6 PM.
- 6. Please keep track of receipts on food spending and take note of your experiences throughout the week. Whenever you go to a store to buy food bring only the cash that is in your budget. In this way you will not be able to buy more than you are supposed to.

We will end our fast on Sunday, March 9 with a "Break-fast" right after the 9:30 AM Mass.



Fourth Sunday of Lent

Fifteen-year-old Ben Underwood of Sacramento, California, is one typical teenager. He loves skateboarding, playing basketball with his friends, and listening to music. Ben also happens to be blind after losing his sight to retinal cancer at the age of three. But thanks to a loving mother who has always told him he can do anything in life he wishes, Ben simply lives his life like his friends. "I'm not blind," he says, "I just can't see."

Many of us who can see are, in fact, blind. We live our lives in the darkness of sin and despair. Today's reading from the Gospel of John illustrates that even after a lifetime-of blindness, we always have the opportunity to see the light-the light of the world that is Jesus Christ. His love flowing through our hearts removes the shroud of darkness and despair, giving us hope and confidence and allowing us to find our way and to follow his greatest commandment, to love one another.

One of the greatest obstacles to true faith is the feeling of doubt. Those who challenge the existence of God, who allow themselves to express doubt, have instilled upon themselves a spiritual blindness (CCC 2088). The first commandment teaches us to always cherish and nurture our faith, protecting it to the point of rejecting any and all opposition to it. On this fourth Sunday of Lent, renew your determination to live in the light of the Lord.

The Agony in the Garden – The Place Where Angels Strengthen Us by Ron Rolheiser, OMI

In a book soon to be released, Trevor Herriot writes: "Only after we have let the desert do its full work in us will angels finally come and minister to us."

That's one of the lessons of Gethsemane. It's only after the deserts of loneliness, duty, and helplessness have done their work in Jesus that "an angel from heaven came and ministered to him." A unique thing can happen to us when we are overwhelmed. When the burden of self-sacrifice prostrates us in weakness and leaves us sweating blood, it's then that God's strength can flow into us most deeply. Many people have experienced this.

Martin Luther King, for example, recounts his own agony in the Garden and the angel that came to strengthen him:

"One night toward the end of January, I settled into bed late, after a strenuous day. Coretta had already fallen asleep and just as I was about to doze off the telephone rang. An angry voice said, `Listen, nigger, we've taken all we want from you, before next week you'll be sorry you ever came to Montgomery.' I hang up, but I couldn't sleep. It seemed that all of my fears had come down on me at once. I had reached a saturation point. I got out of bed and began to walk the floor. Finally I went to the kitchen and heated a pot of coffee. I was ready to give up. With my cup of coffee sitting untouched before me I tried to think of a way to move out of the picture without appearing a coward.

In this state of exhaustion, when my courage had all but gone, I decided to take my problem to God. With my head in my hands, I bowed over the kitchen table and prayed aloud. The words I spoke to God that midnight are still vivid in my memory:

'I am here taking a stand for what I believe is right. But now I am afraid. The people are looking to me for leadership, and if I stand before them without strength and courage, they too will falter. I am at the end of my powers. I have nothing left. I've come to the point where I can't face it alone.'

At that moment I experienced the presence of the Divine as I had never experienced him before."

The parallel to Jesus in Gethsemane is so obvious that it's superfluous to elaborate on it. God sends angels to strengthen us precisely when God finds us lying prostrate, sweating the blood of duty. Moreover that particular

kind of sweat does something else for us as well.

In the Gethsemane accounts we're told that, right after being strengthened by an angel, Jesus gets up off the ground and walks with courage to face the ordeal that awaits him. His agony and the strengthening he receives within it, readied him for the pain that lay ahead. Indeed, at the time of Jesus, the word "agony" had a double sense: Beyond its more obvious meaning, it also referred to a particular readying that an athlete would do just before entering the arena or stadium. An athlete would ready himself (in those days the athlete normally was a he) for the contest by working up a certain sweat (agony) with the idea that this exercise and the lather it produced would concentrate and ready both his energies and muscles for the rigours that lay ahead. No athlete wants to enter the contest unprepared, not ready. The gospel writers want us to have this same image of Jesus as he leaves the Garden of Gethsemane: His agony has brought about a certain emotional, physical, and spiritual lather so that he is now readied, a focused athlete, properly prepared to enter the battle. Moreover, because of his strengthening brings a certain divine energy, he is indeed more ready than any athlete.

Christina Crawford, writing about a low time in her life, once commented: "Lost is a place too!" Indeed, biblically, it's a very important place. It's the place where angels can come and minister to us and it's the place that readies us for spiritual battle. When our own strength gives out, when the pain of duty seems too much, when we lie prostrate in weakness and cringe before what truth, justice, and God seem to be asking of us, when we've come to the point where, like Martin Luther King, we can no longer face it alone, we're finally at that place where angels can minister to us and we've finally worked up the spiritual lather that has readied our souls and bodies for the Good Fridays that await us all.

Certain things, Trevor Herriot suggests, can only happen in gardens and deserts: "How long, covered in the sackcloth of grass, thorn and sky, before our desires and illusions fall to intimations of communion; before edges dissolve and we comprehend the mystic's dream of union beyond all boundaries and distinctions?"


An excerpt from *Poverty in America: A Threat to the Common Good*, Catholic Charities USA 2006 policy paper, Pp 14, 16.

"We should not overlook the fact that the United States has an important set of basic public structures that work effectively to ameliorate poverty and provide opportunity. These include...public programs that address income inadequacy and living standards, such as Social Security, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), the Earned Income Tax Credit, Medicaid, Medicare, and housing assistance;... Such policies have done much to improve living standards in the United States. For example, programs such as Social Security, Medicare, Medicaid, and SSI have resulted in dramatically lower rates of poverty and considerable improvements in the longevity and the quality of life of our nation's elderly and disabled.... Furthermore, according to data from the Census Bureau, the poverty rate for individuals ... would nearly double if it weren't for the income security programs that we have in place. It also is important to recognize that ... the United States ... has an array of benefits [such as health insurance] provided through private entities, typically employers, which are publicly subsidized. ... However, ... political scientist Jacob Hacker notes that "because most private benefits are provided as [a condition] of employment, they are more generous and prevalent among higher-income workers – the very Americans who need them least. ..."

A major limitation of American social policies is their patchwork and categorical nature. For example, many of the 46.6 million Americans now without health insurance are ineligible for Medicare and Medicaid [because they are too young to qualify for Medicare or earn too much to qualify for Medicaid.] Similarly, even though millions of Americans meet the eligibility requirements for programs like child care and housing assistance, they are not all able to receive assistance because funding levels are inadequate. ... The problem isn't necessarily that the United States spends too little overall on social expenditures – but rather that the United States spends too much on private social expenditures that disproportionately benefit those who are most well-off and too little on public social expenditures that are designed to ameliorate inequality and promote the common good [by alleviating poverty.]"


Sharing the Gospel
