Peace and Justice Spotlight

The Church has taken a strong stand on health care and it'd be helpful for each of us to consider the Church's teaching as form our own opinions at health care reform. Bishop William Murphy, our bishop, is also the Chairperson of the Bishops' Committee on Domestic Justice and Human Development. This week we read again from his letter to the Congress of the United States:

Reform efforts must begin with the principle that decent health care is not a privilege, but a right and a requirement to protect the life and dignity of every person. All people need and should have access to comprehensive, quality health care that they can afford, and it should not depend on their stage of life, where or whether they or their parents work, how much they earn, where they live, or where they were born. The Bishops' Conference believes health care reform should be truly universal and it should be genuinely affordable. Many lower-income families simply lack the resources to meet their health care expenses. For these families, significant premiums and cost-sharing charges can serve as barriers to obtaining coverage or seeing a doctor. Therefore, Medicaid cost-sharing protections should be maintained and new coverage options should protect the lowest income enrollees from burdensome cost sharing. We urge Congress to limit premiums or exempt families earning less than 200 percent of the Federal Poverty Level from monthly premiums. We also recommend limiting co-payments and other costs which could discourage needed care. In order to move toward universal coverage, we urge increases in eligibility levels. For example, we urge Congress to maintain at least the proposed minimum national eligibility level for Medicaid at 150 percent and CHIP at 300 percent of the Federal Poverty Level; to ensure comprehensive coverage; and to provide states with the resources to expand coverage.

On **Saturday, September 26, and Sunday, September 27,** participants in our Mission Trip will be sharing their experiences at all Masses. We are also going to ask every parishioner to join us in helping our brothers and sisters in El Salvador.


There are many ways to be involved, but two special projects will be introduced that weekend:

- 1) Sponsor a child or elderly person in El Salvador through the Christian Foundation for Children and Aging (CFCA). Each year, CFCA hosts our trip and shows us the wonderful work they do among the poor in El Salvador. They have sent us photos and profiles of 100 children and elderly from El Salvador who need our help. Sponsorship costs \$30 per month, and helps to provide for basic nutrition, health, and education. We saw firsthand the difference sponsorship makes, and we hope that some of our OLL family will join this important work. We will have sign-up information on the 26th-27th, or you can visit CFCA's website at www.cfcausa.org.
- 2) Participate on Our Lady of Lourdes' CASA Project to build homes for people in our sister parish communities. For only \$1500, a solid and safe home can be constructed in El Salvador. Our goal this year is to build 20 homes as a parish. To fund this project, we will be selling special house-shaped piggy banks, and the "Piggy Back Project" will return to OLL! We will ask our parishioners to return their spare change (not the banks) to our special coin receptacles at the doors on the first Sunday of every month. Wouldn't it be wonderful if we could take pictures of the 20 homes we built when we go to El Salvador next year!

Be a Life Saver – GIVE BLOOD

800 pints of blood are needed **every day** to meet the needs of the patients in our area hospitals. One pint of blood can save three lives because blood is divided into components and can be used for up to three patients with different critical needs.

But... We do not collect enough blood in this area to meet this need. Blood that was available to us from Europe is no longer available. Maintaining the blood supply has become a national problem. Only 2 people out of 100 who are able to donate blood are actually doing it!

The need for blood is daily. It must be there when it is needed. Almost half the blood that is transfused is done on an emergency basis. **Blood cannot be stockpiled**. Red cells are viable for 35–42 days, but platelets must be used within 5 days.

Please care enough to give blood on **Wednesday, October 7**, from 3:30 to 8:30 PM in the All **Purpose Room**. To make an appointment, please call Marie at 669.5837 or just walk in the day of the drive. (Whole blood can be donated every 56 days.)

Your gift of blood may mean another day of life for someone, another birthday, another anniversary, another hug, another smile. Love makes it all worthwhile.

25th Sunday in Ordinary Time

It is perhaps one of the most exciting and yet frightening times of a young couple's lives. From the moment they discover that they are expecting a child to the very moment that he or she enters the world, the parents-to-be are filled with joy, but also concern. Will their baby be healthy? Today's doctors can detect health issues long before the baby is born; if something is discovered, how does the young couple receive the news? Are they faced with difficult decisions, or are they bolstered by the message found in today's Gospel?

Given the circumstances of today's fast-paced life, it is difficult to imagine the pace of life in Jesus' day. On a journey by foot through Galilee, Jesus and his disciples had many hours to discuss the meaning of life and the role of Christ in their lives. He tried to explain his final days and hours, but even with seemingly all the time in the world, they did not grasp the immense message he was giving them. Perhaps seeking an easier way to say it, he held a small child, telling them that if they accept an innocent child, they are accepting him, and in accepting him, they are accepting God.

In praying the Lord's Prayer, we first and foremost proclaim "Our Father." This is done with the intent to remind us that in order to be fully revealed in our hearts, we must appear to God as innocents, children willing to accept his love unconditionally. We are asking for a purification of our hearts (CCC 2779). As Jesus held that small child out to his disciples, he gave absolutely no conditions as to acceptance of a child. As innocents, children are the symbol of the purity of life and the purity of the love Jesus has for us all.

St. Pius X Enriched Living Facility Fund

"Caring for those who cared for us"

Today is the inaugural special collection for the retired priests of our Diocese who are residing at St. Pius X Enriched Living Facility in Amityville. The collection aims to fill the gap in the budget for St. Pius X in Amityville, a new special care facility for retired priests of our Diocese.

There are currently 116 retired priests in our Diocese, a group of whom requires assistance with daily living. To accommodate these priests, our Diocese has created an innovative enriched living facility to replace the former St. Pius X Residence in Uniondale. The new facility, also called St. Pius X, is located within Dominican Village in Amityville. It offers wheelchair accessibility, nutrition counseling, transportation into town, and computerized emergency call systems. In addition to these necessities, St. Pius X in Amityville allows our retired priests to live together in community, in a setting that fosters their spiritual lives, nurtures their physical and mental well being, and guarantees that they can continue to live their older years with dignity.

It is important to differentiate between this new upcoming Second Collection for Retired Priests and the Retired Religious Collection. On the Shores of Babylon

Henri Nouwen once remarked that he found it curious that many of the people he knew who were very angry and bitter were people he had met in church circles and places of ministry.

He is not alone in that. Many of us, I suspect, could say the same thing. We often find more anger and whining than joy within church circles because there we can justify anger and disappointment in the name of something sacred.

There is a biblical name for this particular type of anger and whining. This is called being on the shores of Babylon, feeling exiled from your own faith experience.

We are all familiar with the Psalm 137 (popularized in songs) that sings out the lament: By the rivers of Babylon, there we sat and wept, remembering Zion; on the poplars that grew there we hung up our harps. How could we sing a song of the Lord on alien soil? Let my tongue cleave to my mouth, if I remember you not, if I prize not Jerusalem above all my joys!

There is an interesting background to this lament: After Israel had entered the Promised Land, received God's law, became one kingdom, and built a temple to worship in, she felt politically secure and confident in her faith. Her confidence in faith was very much rooted in possessing three material things: a land, a king, and a temple. God had promised these and God had delivered on that promise. After much struggle they finally had their own land, their own king, and their own temple. These were now the pillars of their faith, their guarantee that God was real and with them. Naively they expected it would stay that way forever.

It was not to be: neighboring Assyria, overtook them, conquered the land, deported the people, killed the king, and knocked the temple down to its last stone. Israel now found herself in exile in Babylon, with no land, no king, no temple; and, seemingly, no reason to continue to have faith in God. Her faith, anchored as it was in land, king, and temple, now seemed empty, a dream gone sour. She felt exiled, not just from her own land but from her own faith. Someone had taken away her land, king, and temple and, with them, seemingly her reason to trust in God.

She was left with some painful questions: How can there be a God, if God promised to be present in a

land, a king, and a temple, and these are gone? Moreover, how can we be happy in such a situation? Someone had stolen my faith and my church and I will not be happy about that! The laments of Babylon are in the end a euphemism for whining and anger.

But they echo the bitter, whining poetics we hear today in our own church circles: liberals and conservatives, equally unhappy, each blaming the other for somehow stealing away the other's church, for ruining something that was dear to them, and for putting them on an unhappy shore. In Roman Catholic circles these laments often pit Vatican II against John Paul II with both sides are equally protesting: How can we be joyous and gracious in this situation! It is no different in Protestant circles. There is lamentation everywhere. We are on the shores of Babylon, unhappy, given over to whining.

What we need to hear in all this is the answer that God gave to Israel when she first expressed that religious unhappiness: Where is God when someone has taken away your land, king, and temple? God's answer: "You will find me again when you search for me in a deeper way, with your whole heart!"

God is beyond any material land, ruler, or church building. God is also beyond any church council and any pope, no matter how true or great these may in fact be. The dark night of pain and insecurity we experience whenever we feel like we are on the shores of Babylon is the purifying pain that comes with finding out that everything that is religiously precious to us, everything we want to identify with God himself, eventually gets crucified (just as Jesus did) and in the wake of the disillusionment we find ourselves in a free-fall, losing a grip on what once anchored our faith. And we will continue to free-fall until ultimately we lose everything so as to fall right to the bedrock of faith itself, God, solidity beyond all material lands, kings, and temples.

That is the difference between and an icon and an idol. Idolatry forgets that the icon is not God. No matter how true and wonderful an icon might be, there comes a time when it has to be taken away from us. Then we find ourselves on the shores of Babylon, insecure, feeling exiled, unhappy, but hearing this from God: You will find me and your joy again when you search for me in a deeper way, with all your heart, mind, and soul!


