





El Salvador!



This year's trip to El Salvador was a wonderful success and a beautiful experience for all those who participated. We are all looking forward to next year's trip and in the meantime we aim to help our friends in Central America as much as we can.

On **Saturday, September 26, and Sunday, September 27,** participants in our Mission Trip will be sharing their experiences at all Masses. We are also going to ask every parishioner to join us in helping our brothers and sisters in El Salvador.

There are many ways to be involved, but two special projects will be introduced that weekend:

- 1) Sponsor a child or elderly person in El Salvador through the Christian Foundation for Children and Aging (CFCA). Each year, CFCA hosts our trip and shows us the wonderful work they do among the poor in El Salvador. They have sent us photos and profiles of 100 children and elderly from El Salvador who need our help. Sponsorship costs \$30 per month, and helps to provide for basic nutrition, health, and education. We saw firsthand the difference sponsorship makes, and we hope that some of our OLL family will join this important work. We will have sign-up information on the 26th-27th, or you can visit CFCA's website at www.cfcausa.org.
- 2) Participate on Our Lady of Lourdes' CASA Project to build homes for people in our sister parish communities. For only \$1500, a solid and safe home can be constructed in El Salvador. Our goal this year is to build 20 homes as a parish. To fund this project, we will be selling special house-shaped piggy banks, and the "Piggy Back Project" will return to OLL! We will ask our parishioners to return their spare change (not the banks) to our special coin receptacles at the doors on the first Sunday of every month. Wouldn't it be wonderful if we could take pictures of the 20 homes we built when we go to El Salvador next year!

Quite simply, blood is LIFE, but frankly, there sometimes isn't enough to go around. That's why it's critical for all of us to do our part in expanding the blood supply, so everyone who so desperately needs blood gets it.

On Wednesday, October 7, Our Lady of Lourdes Parish will hold a BLOOD DRIVE from 3:30 PM to 8:30 PM. The Drive will be held in the All Purpose Room.

All eligible donors are strongly urged to give blood.

To donate you must be between the ages of 16 (with parental consent) and 72 (individuals over 75 can donate with written permission from their physician, dated within one year), in good health, and weigh at least 110 pounds.

All donors must show proof of identification and should eat some food before donating. Donating blood is easy and completely safe. The donation includes a mini-health exam, including blood pressure, pulse, temperature and iron count. The entire donation process takes about one hour (the actual donation takes about 10 minutes). After the donation, donors rest and enjoy light refreshments, then are able to go back to their normal day.

26th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Envy and jealousy are emotions we're all familiar with; they seem to appear with ease and yet are almost impossible to suppress or destroy. A coworker receives a promotion, and perhaps we wonder why it wasn't us. A neighbor announces she is building a new house, and suddenly our house is showing its age. A friend finds time to volunteer at a homeless shelter and participates in several ministries at your parish, all the while smiling about his life, and you wonder how negative his home life must be. Yet when you are blessed with good fortune by God, aren't you ready to shout it from the rooftops?

In today's Gospel reading from Mark, the disciples of Jesus have witnessed someone casting out demons in the name of Christ. Yet, as they point out, this person hasn't spent the time they have, following closely in the company of Jesus and listening to his teachings. Surely he can't be qualified, they say. Jesus gently reminds his disciples that any person who attempts to do truly good things in his name is a child of God. Perhaps the disciples were a bit envious; perhaps they failed to recognize that the abilities of this person were gifts from God, and in attempting to stop him they were attempting to deny God's wisdom in granting such gifts.

Jesus tells us the second greatest commandment, after loving God with all our hearts, is to love our neighbors as ourselves (CCC 2055). The tenth commandment serves to instill in us the desire to abolish envy and jealously completely. If we are willing to acknowledge that everything we have and are is a gift of God, we cannot afford to challenge God's wisdom in his gifts to others.

Mary, Our Model of Love and Outreach

(This is a copy of the short reflection offered during the "Walk with Mary" celebrated at the Italian Family Feast on Saturday, September 19)

It is the small acts of kindness and love, repeated - performed daily - over and over that make the difference....

I was thinking of the TV show "Extreme Makeover, Home Edition." You may be familiar with the television show which airs weekly. Each week, a family who has experienced a tragedy or crises is selected to receive a complete home renovation. As the show opens we, the viewers, learn about the family and their particular needs. We listen as members of the family share the impact of the tragedy on their lives. We enter into their homes and see first hand, dwellings that are so substandard we wonder how the family has survived. How many times do we watch the show and are moved to tears. Each episode is truly an Extreme Makeover. Homes are demolished and rebuilt in one week-completely gutted and fully appointed one week later with new furnishings, appliances, clothing, sometimes new vehicles, playrooms, pools, gyms, workshops. As we watch, it seems that no need is left unfilled, the family receives a second chance, the opportunity to start over and rebuild shattered lives. The drama continues throughout the hour as we watch the crew struggle through long days and nights to complete the project; with the end ever in view-the moment when the family pulls up in front of their new home. Crowds gather outside the family's new home. It is truly a spectacular moment! And we get to watch this every week!

But, we all know that on a basic and simple level-it is the small acts of kindness and love, repeated...performed daily....over and over that really make the difference. And for that model, we look for our example, not in the extremes...but to the very gentle and tender mother of Jesus, Mary. It was she, who over

and over in simple ways ministered to Jesus as a child-who nurtured to not only his hunger and thirst, but to his heart and soul....she cared for her son when he was ill and in the end, stood by him as he died. From Mary, we learn about the consistency of love-of being present always...in good times, (Wedding of Cana)- and in the painful and difficult times. We can be certain that Mary held the child Jesus her arms and held his body, one last time after his death on the cross. We can be sure that she rocked him to sleep, sang songs to him and taught him the prayers he prayed as an adult. It would not be a stretch to imagine that Mary's tender and loving care to Jesus was the inspiration for the Gospel words spoken by Jesus: "Whatever you do to the least of these, you do to me."

Mary is a wonderful Model for the works of Outreach, which are so faithfully supported by this Parish Family. Mary reminds us, that it is, in fact the simple acts of love and kindness performed each day that make the difference. For it is in the donation of a box of cereal, the donation of a package of meat, the offering of alms for the poor among us, these very simple blessings from each of you- has the potential to transform the lives of others. In your giving, Outreach truly is able to embrace those who struggle, who are hungry, ill, without shelter. Outreach a viable ministry in this community embraces those in need through dedication of volunteers and donors alike. And so, really, we are like Extreme Makeover-except, in our giving, we are building the Body of Christ with Mary as our foundation. We don't need the extravagant, for we offer what makes a difference. We offer, as did Mary, compassion for those in need and that is magnificent!

Struggling with our own Inadequacy by Ron Rolheiser, OMI

It is hard to measure up. In our lucid moments we admit this. Rarely is there a day when we could not echo these words by Anna Blaman:

I realized that it was simply impossible for a human being to be and remain good or pure. If, for instance, I wanted to be attentive in one direction, it could only be at the cost of neglecting another. If I gave my heart to one thing, it left another in the cold. No day and no hour go by without my being guilty of inadequacy. We never do enough, and what we do is never well enough done, except being inadequate, which we are good at because that is the way we are made. This is true of me and of everyone else. Every day and every hour brings with it its weight of moral guilt, as regards my work and my relations with others. I am constantly catching myself out in my human failings and, in spite of their being implied in my human imperfection, I am conscious of a sort of check. And this means that my human shortcomings are also my human guilt. It sounds strange that we should be guilty where we can do nothing about it. But even where there is no set purpose, no deliberate intention, we have a conviction of our own shortcomings, and of consensual guilt, a guilt which shows itself all too clearly in the consequences of what we have done or left undone.

Henri Nouwen occasionally expressed similar feelings: There is a nagging sense that there are unfinished tasks, unfulfilled promises, unrealized proposals. There is always something else that we should have remembered, done, or said. There are always people we did not speak to, write to, or visit. Thus, although we are very busy, we also have a lingering feeling of never really fulfilling our obligations. A gnawing sense of being unfulfilled underlies our filled lives.

When we are in touch with ourselves, we can relate to these words, these expressions of inadequacy. At the end of the day, we cannot measure up and cannot not disappoint others and ourselves. Generally the fault is not that we are not sincere or that we do not put out the effort. The fault is that we are human. We have limited resources, get tired, experience feelings we cannot control, have only 24 hours in our day, have too many demands on us, have wounds and weaknesses that shackle us, and thus know exactly what St. Paul

meant when he said: Woe, to me, wretch that I am, the good I want to do, I cannot do; and the evil I want to avoid, I end up doing!

That may sound negative, neurotic, and stoic, and it can be those things, but, appropriated properly, it can generate hope and renewed energy in our lives. To be human is to be inadequate, by definition. Only God is adequate and the rest of us can safely say to ourselves: Fear not you are inadequate! But a God who made us this way surely gives us the slack, the forgiveness, and the grace we need to work with this. Personally, I take consolation from the gospel parable of the ten bridesmaids who, while waiting for the bridegroom, all fell asleep, wise and the foolish alike. Even the wise were too human and too weak to stay awake the whole time. Nobody does it perfectly and accepting this, our congenital inadequacy, can bring us to a healthy humility and perhaps even to a healthy humor about it.

But it should bring us to something more: prayer, especially the Eucharist.

The Eucharist is, among other things, a vigil of waiting. When Jesus instituted the Eucharist he told the disciples to keep celebrating it until he returned again. A biblical scholar, Gerhard Lofink, puts it this way: The early apostolic communities cannot be understood outside of the matrix of intense expectation. They were communities imminently awaiting Christ's return. They gathered in Eucharist, among other reasons, to foster and sustain this awareness, namely, that they were living in wait, waiting for Christ to return.

I try to celebrate Eucharist every day. I do this because I am a priest and part of the covenant a priest makes with the church at his ordination is to pray the priestly prayer of Jesus, the Eucharist and the Liturgy of the Hours, regularly for the world. But I do it too, more personally, for another reason: The older I get, the less confident, in some ways, I am becoming. I don't always know whether I'm following Christ properly or even know exactly what it means to follow Christ, and so I stake my faith on an invitation that Jesus left us on the night before he died: To break bread and drink wine in his memory and to trust that this, if all else is uncertain, is what we should be doing while we wait for him to return.


