## Reflections on the Mission Trip to El Salvador

My first impression, driving from the airport to Santa Ana, is that the country is lush and exotic. Then you feel the heat. It was neither as hot nor oppressively humid sa I expected. We arrived in sunshine during the "wet" season.

One notices, as you drive through the larger towns, that all the houses are "fortified" with wrought iron on all windows and doors. Razor and barbed wire runs along the perimeter of all outside walls, and even the interior courtyard walls are about 20' high. All houses are attached to each other. There are no alleys or open backyards such as we have. We were told that this was the result of the 12 years or so of civil war.

At the Christian Foundation for the Children and Aging (CFCA) center, we were warmly greeted and well taken care of throughout our stay. The food and friendship were great!

After breakfast on the second day, we left for Mojotes, a distant community in the mountains. When the CFCA minivans could take us no further, we traveled in the back of pick-up trucks up the rocky mountain road. That was really fun!

When we arrived at Mojotes, the whole community was standing in two groups with a path between them for us to walk to the church. They applauded us all the way into the church. At first, it made me feel "unworthy", but one could easily see how grateful and truly happy they were to see us.

Mass was beautiful, with lovely acoustic guitar music, Spanish songs and BATS! Fr. Mike and Deacon Tom said Mass. At the handshake of peace, we were swarmed as everyone tried to hug the Padrinos. As many kids as possible squeezed into the pews with us and sat on our laps.

After Mass, we divided into groups for home visits. My group went to visit the family of Don Israel Cartagena Villalobes. The family consisted of Don Israel, his wife, Rosa, Hugo (almost 6), Idalia (almost 4), and Enrique (21 days old). They all lived in a "house" about the size of my daughter's bedroom. Some walls were made of twigs, not even boards, and other walls were black plastic sheeting, similar to our lawn bags. They cooked and ate on a roofed porch with a single light bulb. The "stove" was a broken cinderblock and a wood fire.

We were honored to be able to converse with Don Israel and his father about their lives. There was a lot to learn. When asked, "What are the hopes and dreams for your children?" Don Israel answered, "I have no hopes or dreams for them. I can't see how they will ever rise above their conditions. We have no way to improve ourselves." Henry, our group's leader, answered by saying, "I don't like what you just said. Where there is God, there is always hope. Where there is solidarity with others, we can find a way." The plight of Don Israel and his family is heartbreaking. My family and I chose to sponsor his daughter, Idalia. Another patron is sponsoring his son, Hugo, who begins school this next school year.

One of the most pleasant days we spent, was at a CFCA sponsored picnic at a picturesque lake with our sponsored families. It was a wonderful opportunity to get to know them better. I found it remarkable to see with how much dignity and grace they lived their lives despite the enormous hardships they faced every day.

This reflection covers only a fraction of our visit. We could write tons about all the impressions we had and emotions we felt. Without a doubt, all three of us know that we are forever changed, hopefully a little more enlightened, and determined to work toward helping others.


This wonderful fundraiser featured the teachers and staff serving a delicious pasta dinner to the parents, students, and parishioners of Our Lady of Lourdes.

## **Christ the King**

When we were little children, we were given many examples of kings, mostly in fairy tales. These were usually red-robed gentlemen who either ruled with an iron fist or spent most of their time trying to marry off their beautiful daughters. As we grew, we learned of kings who constantly battled neighboring kings for territorial conquests. None of those kings seems to coincide with what we are taught about the greatest one of all, Christ the King. Where others lead by authoritarian rule, our King leads us by serving, and by giving us his greatest treasure, love. How can we now define king any other way?

We are nearly to Advent, the time in which we all pause and celebrate the period of waiting for a coming Savior, a king for all the people. Today is the last Sunday of the liturgical calendar, and is the feast of Christ the King. In today's reading, Pilate repeatedly asks Jesus if he is king of the Jews. His answer? "You say I am a king." In the footnotes to the New American Bible, it says that this is a "reluctant affirmative" at best. In other words, Jesus probably felt Pilate would never understand the type of king Jesus was; it was best to answer with a non-answer.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches us that we, the people of God, share in the royal office of Christ. In his kingship, he draws all of us to him, asking us to reign as he did, in service to others (CCC 786). The people of the time of Jesus' earthly life had heard of a coming king and savior for many generations; their own experience with kings led them to believe their king would be a mighty ruler as well. But this King of Kings, the greatest of all, spoke softly, served others, showed compassion for all, and asked only for love in return.

## Longing, Desire, and the Face of God by Ron Rolheiser, OMI

At the center of our experience lies an incurable dis-ease, a disquiet, a restlessness, a loneliness, a longing, a yearning, a desire, an ache for something we can never quite name. For what are we longing? What would satisfy our restless energy?

Anne Frank, in her famous diary, asks exactly this question: Today the sun is shining, the sky is a deep blue, there is a lovely breeze and I am longing - so longing - for everything. To talk, for freedom, for friends, to be alone. And I do so long ... to cry! I feel as if I am going to burst, and I know it would get better with crying; but I can't. I'm restless, I go from room to room, breathe through the crack of a closed window, feel my heart beating, as if it was saying, 'can't you satisfy my longing at last?' I believe that it is spring within me; I feel that spring is awakening. I feel it in my whole body and soul. It is an effort to behave normally, I feel utterly confused. I don't know what to read, what to write, what to do, I only know that I am longing.

That same question is asked everywhere. What would satisfy us? Why this relentless restlessness? In her Children of Violence series of novels, Nobel-prize winning novelist, Doris Lessing, has her heroine, Martha Quest, pose that question as life's central question: Towards what is all of our energy directed? Devoid of a religious perspective, Martha can only understand human desire as blind, erotic energy, a kind of voltage, ten thousand volts of energy inside us. For what? For whatever we choose - creativity, love, sex, hate, martyrdom, boredom.

What are we longing for ultimately? What would satisfy our restless hearts?

Classically, Christian spirituality has answered the question with a single image, all of our restlessness and disquiet is ultimately a longing to see the face of God. Most famously, Augustine put it this way: You have made us for yourself, Lord, and our hearts are restless until the rest in you! In writing that, Augustine drew upon personal experience, but also upon a motif that had long expressed itself within religious men and women.

The idea begins early in the Jewish scriptures: Already at the time of Moses, people are asking the question: Who can see the face of God? We see this in Moses himself when he goes up the mountain to meet God. He asks to see God's face. God replies: No one can see the face of God and live! (Exodus 33,20) However, when Moses asks this question his desire is still quite literal, his desire is to physically see God.

But as their faith matures, the people of the Israel begin to understand this motif differently. Longing to see the face of God eventually is understood not so much as the physical curiosity to see what God looks like, but rather as an image, a symbol, an end-point for all human desire. To see the face of God is to have all desire quenched, all restlessness stilled, all aching quieted. To see the face of God is to attain complete peace. This is what the Psalmist means by the words: As a deer yearns for flowing streams, so I yearn to see the face of God. I thirst for the living God; when shall I see the face of God? (Psalm 42,1-2)

By the time of Jesus, the idea is everywhere present in Jewish spirituality that the only answer to human longing is to see the face of God. To see God's face is to come to peace. But we are still left with the question: Who can see the face of God? How is this to be achieved?

Jesus gives an answer: Who can see the face of God? He answers simply: Blessed are the pure of heart, they shall see the face of God. (Matthew 5, 8) That simple phrase then became a one-line mandate to encompass the entire spiritual quest. The Desert Fathers, the classical mystics, and subsequent Christian spirituality in general have focused on one thing in their praxis - attaining purity of heart so as to see the face of God. To work at attaining purity of heart is the ultimate spiritual task.

It is also life's ultimate task. We long for many things and like Doris Lessing's heroine, Martha, are both buoyed up and fatigued by our own insatiable energies. These energies push us in every direction, towards creativity, love, sex, hate, martyrdom, boredom. Sometimes we know what we want, a particular relationship, achievement, acceptance, status, job, or home, and we believe that we will find peace by attaining it, but experience has taught us that full peace of heart will not be found, even there. Where will it be found? In purity of heart, in removing those things inside of us that block our connection to the author of all the persons, places, beauty, love, color, and energies for which we ache.


