

Praying the Rosary

October 7: Our Lady of the Rosary

October is the month of the Rosary, and October 7 is the feast of Our Lady of the Rosary. The Rosary to the High Middle Ages was a substitute for the Divine Office for the religious and laity who could not read the psalms. On a ring of beads, they would pray 150 “Our Fathers” which by the 12th century, were Hail Mary’s.


Dominican friars divided the prayers into decades, each one eventually recalling events in the history of salvation called the joyful, sorrowful and glorious mysteries.

The Rosary is a Christ-centered prayer. Paul VI in his encyclical, *Marialis Cultis*, called the Rosary a type of contemplation and wrote, “By its nature, the recitation of the Rosary calls for a quiet rhythm and a lingering pace, helping the individual to meditate on the mysteries of the Lord’s life as seen through the eyes of her who was closest to the Lord.”



The Rosary

The Rosary is a meditation, a time to recall and think about the life of Jesus as seen and experienced by Mary. As the model of faith, Mary’s life sets a pattern that we strive to follow: saying ‘yes’ to God’s will in our lives and sharing His love and message with others. The Mysteries of the Rosary form a mini-lesson of faith, using the highlights and significant moments of the life of Jesus. Like paging through a family scrapbook, we see in brief the events of salvation history that are the core of our belief and the hope of our eternal life.





Pastoral Letter on Society's Responsibility to the Poor and Vulnerable

fifth in a series...

The Condition of the Covenant in New York State: What We See


There is much that we see for which all of us must be grateful, much that is joyful and hopeful both in the benefits of our state's economy and in its provision for people who are poor and struggling...

During the past few years, New York has raised its minimum wage, provided a safety net as part of welfare reform, established health care programs for working poor adults and their children, and increased its Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) for working families. New York has often been a leader in creating imaginative and successful approaches to alleviating poverty. New York's legacy of welcoming immigrants remains a standard for our nation. New York State's legal mandate to care for its most vulnerable members is embodied in Article XVII of the state constitution that requires provision for the needy.

...Along with great promise and opportunity for some, many others must struggle daily to survive and confront anxiety and grief in their lives... Even though they too work hard at agricultural, landscaping, restaurant, and other low-paying jobs, their income is often inadequate to feed and support their families, and pay for adequate housing and health care. Many other families, at much higher incomes, live paycheck to paycheck, and share with them the anxiety that injury, illness or loss of their job could send their family into a tragic downward spiral.

Finally, many people and families are being *left behind*, because they often lack education and job skills, and the support of family and community networks. They encounter barriers to finding work and advancing in the jobs they do find. In some cases, problems with alcohol and substance abuse must be overcome. Under the demands of the Covenant, we must ensure that those *left behind* are not forgotten. We must maintain the commitment to a safety net and to the supports necessary for them to move out of poverty.

Three million New Yorkers live without health insurance, two thirds of whom are in working families (One million New Yorkers are eligible for coverage but have not been enrolled).



28th Sunday of Ordinary Time

Young children and the young at heart love invitations to parties, celebrations, weddings and special events. It makes us feel special and gives us a chance to break out of our routine and do something different. Invitations are a sign that we matter, that others want us to share in their joy and happiness.

In the parable of the wedding guests, no one accepts the invitation of the king. They are too busy to honor his request and refuse to come, even going so far as to kill the messengers. It is not that they are apologetic, or that they even offer an excuse. There is something in their refusal that reveals hardened hearts and stubborn spirits. It is a parable about God sending His Son as Messiah, a parable about sin and the invitation to grace.

God always invites us to His celebration of life and grace. To accept the invitation, we need to repent, to turn away from sin and back to God. Often we don't refuse God directly, but choose instead to ignore Him by remaining in our sinfulness. Now is our chance to enter the banquet, to be closer to God and to His people. Don't refuse His request. Share in His joy and His love.




