You know the line about opera: "It ain't over till the fat lady sings." The same is true about Sunday Mass. And no, the "fat lady" is not the cantor. She's us—all of us—the church! Sated (miraculously with just a morsel and a sip), stuffed on grace, a bit tired from sincere thanksgiving and sustained praise, the assembly has to finish this liturgy before it's over. Would the cast leave before the final curtain? The orchestra before the finale? The team before the final buzzer or last out? At Mass, we are all the cast, all the orchestra, all the team.

The end of Mass comes quickly: After the silent revery that follows communion, there is a prayer and maybe a hymn. Some announcements follow, then a blessing and dismissal, perhaps a final song. So is it really asking too much of each other to see it through to the very end? Sure, you might be blocking in someone's car in the parking lot. But if we all stay till the end, what difference does it make? Of course the little ones are antsy; we all are at this point. A few minutes more won't hurt. (Nor will cries and squirming now.) And yes, not slipping out early means rubbing elbows with everyone, people jamming up at the doors and a procession of cars crawling out of the parking lot, but isn't this a consequence of the communion that we just shared? Isn't this how we know that we are becoming what we have shared: the body of Christ, risen from the dead, going out into the world to give to others what has been given to us?

It's a simple act of kindness—finishing the liturgy before leaving. And if we slow down just enough to finish our liturgy, maybe we'll slowly learn to finish well other things in life, too. And when we learn to relish and not rush the end of things—the last minutes of a movie, the final words of a conversation, the last hand of cards and the final set of pins to knock down—what we are truly learning is to relish and not rush the end of our days—a final act of gratitude that gives God praise.

Staying for the End!

We need to really work on staying until the end of Mass (i.e. the Closing Hymn) each week here at OLL! Those who leave Mass early usually leave after receiving Communion. They're missing the "Prayer After Communion" and the "Concluding Rite of the Mass." A lot goes on here and maybe some understanding in this area will help our entire community understand the importance of staying until the end of Mass.

Prayer After Communion

The "Prayer After Communion" generally takes place after some silence after the reception of Communion. The silence is important. As one parishioner commented, "This is the only place I can come to for quiet." As important as it is to sing – it's just as important to be still and to know the presence of God in those moments as well!

The "Prayer After Communion" is meant to conclude the Liturgy of the Eucharist. The priest leads us in prayer – usually thanking God for the gift of the Eucharist and asking for the Lord's help in making the gift of the Eucharist more than something we receive, but something we can become.

Top Ten Reasons People Don't Sing at Mass

#4 – The music changes too frequently. I can't learn the music that quickly.

True – we do add new music to the parish repertoire each year. New music allows new gifts to shine and brings an even greater sense of spirit to the liturgy. We do add music, but do it very slowly. Studies suggest that it takes hearing a song up to at least ten times before you really get used to it. Think of some of OLL's greatest hits....we didn't learn "All Are Welcome" or "Christ Be Our Light" the first time. It took awhile – and listen to us now! So be open as we carefully add new music to our parish's Masses and prayer services.

Let's continue to pray for and with one another that we can sing a new song to the Lord as a parish community!





Confirmation

Last week our Confirmation candidates took another step towards their Confirmation on November 3, 2005. They celebrated the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Led by Father Bob, the candidates and their families were challenged to consider the example of the Prodigal Son – to know that God loves us no matter what! We are called to be a bit more open to God's love and to seek it out. Let's pray that this experience and all of the experiences leading to Confirmation will empower and strengthen our Confirmation candidates as they continue to "acknowledge (they) are not complete without the willingness to grow, discern and discover the Spirit that moves and guides us." 

Pastoral Letter on Society's Responsibility to the Poor and Vulnerable

Our Recommendations for Just Economic Policies

sixth in a series...

... Catholic teaching affirms that all people deserve basic human rights including economic rights to what is necessary for a life lived in dignity. These include the right to work and support a family, to housing, to health care and to education. The Covenant requires that we guarantee the same protection and opportunities for the people who wait on our tables, clean up our yards, harvest our food, care for our elderly relatives, clean our offices, and work for their public assistance, as we do for those who are working in more secure higher paying jobs. These just claims must be met even when times are difficult.

The New York State Catholic Conference, which is the public policy advocate for the Catholic Church in New York, has developed a public policy agenda which includes our recommendations for protecting human life, meeting basic human needs, and providing education and health care... What follows are policy directions that we believe must continue to guide us as we set our economic, social and fiscal priorities for this year and the years ahead.

Work:

·Continued consideration of ways to enhance workers' incomes such as the minimum wage and the Earned Income Tax Credit;

•Increased commitment to both prepare people for work and to equip them with skills necessary for the job market; •Increased public assistance benefits levels and strengthening of the housing, day care and health care supports necessary for families transitioning from public assistance to work.

Health:

- ·Maintenance of the integrity of Medicaid, Child Health Plus and Family Health Plus;
- Intensification of outreach to assist eligible families to apply for health benefits and to maintain their coverage;
- ·Continued efforts toward the goal of extending health care to all;

Education:

- ·Provision of adequate funding for education in New York state;
- •Enable all parents, especially those who are poor and/or have children with special needs, to access schools and programs that most appropriately meet the needs of their children.

Homelessness and Housing:

- ·Provide transitional and supportive housing and subsidies like the Federal Section 8 program to help people move from public assistance to work and to protect those who cannot work;
- ·Preserve low-income housing and develop decent housing for all of our people.



29th Sunday of Ordinary Time

Someday, just maybe, someone will invent a time machine so we can talk to the Founding Fathers of our country. Once and for all we could resolve the question of Church and state. What is the relationship between the two? Is one exclusive of the other? What did they intend? But for now, we will have to be satisfied with lots of debate and discussion.

Even Jesus had to face the question of religion and state. Taxes were a fact of life and at times caused the Jews some moral as well as social concerns. But Jesus was not drawn into it. His answer to give God what is God's and Caesar what is Caesar's sidesteps the dispute and puts things into perspective. The real power of both religion and state is seen when each fulfills its proper role in sustaining and supporting the dignity of every person, a way in which each can be judged as moral and good.

Faith trumps all we are and all we do and all we have. Both church and state can benefit from working together, but we can never compromise our core beliefs and values. Regardless of what the state deems legal and right, the Gospel is the final measure of what is moral and just. We answer to a higher authority than political leaders. Our faith must guide us in our political lives, choices and decisions.
