In this way your fast will be the giving up of what someone else needs.

Guidelines for OLL Lenten Food Stamp Fast

Sunday, March 2 - Sunday, March 9

All participants will be invited to begin their week of fasting with a blessing at mass on the weekend of **March 1/2.** The blessing will be given at all masses that weekend and will officially begin our week of fasting in solidarity with the poor. We ask that, as much as is possible, you observe the following guidelines. Participating in the fast is symbolic, and we recognize that some may not be able to keep to the guidelines exactly (especially where there are health concerns, etc.) It is the spirit of the fast that is important, rather than how well you adhere to individual guidelines below. Let's spend the week mindful of those who do not have choices as we do.

Participation Guidelines

- 1. The Food Stamp budget is approximately \$21 per person per week. Since those on food stamps might also receive some other assistance, we will also add:
- a) a \$40 allotment per family to buy staples only (rice, canned food, etc.) as these are items a needy family would receive from a food pantry or outreach center.
- b) If there are children in your household add \$10 per child per week since school children often receive a federal free lunch program.
- 2. All food purchased and eaten during the Challenge week, including fast food and dining out must be included in the total spending.
- 3. During the Challenge, only eat food that you purchase for the project. Do not eat food that you already own (this does *not* include spices and condiments).
- 4. Avoid accepting free food from friends, family or at work.
- 5. Since part of a typical food stamp recipient's week might include a visit to a soup kitchen, you will be invited to a Soup Supper at OLL on Wednesday, March 5 at 6 PM.
- 6. Please keep track of receipts on food spending and take note of your experiences throughout the week. Whenever you go to a store to by food bring only the cash that is in your budget. In this way you will not be able to buy more than you are supposed to.

We will end our fast on Sunday, March 9 with a "Break-fast" right after the 9:30 AM Mass.




You're Invited to Join Us for Our... 6th Annual Mission Awareness Retreat

First Sunday of Lent

Every October, approximately 40,000 people fill the street just outside of Grant Park in Chicago for the running of the Chicago Marathon. They nervously stretch in anticipation of the race ahead of them; they have trained for months for this day. With a horn's loud blare, they are off, a sea of humanity following a path to a finish line. Throughout the race, perfect strangers offer encouragement to those slowing down: "Don't give up!"

Jesus had known in his heart of the path on which his heavenly Father had placed him. And now, as he began his journey, he was immediately offered an opportunity to give up, to take the easy way out. Inadequate Government Funding for Child Care

Child care makes it possible for thousands of Long Island parents to work; it is essential to the economic survival of working poor parents. On Long Island, child care is a \$612 million dollar industry that has been estimated to generate almost \$2 in total additional sales for every dollar spent on child care. The quality and funding of child care is determined by a mix of market forces and government policies. The State government determines, county by county, market rates for child care services. For example, the current market rate for Nassau and Suffolk County children, ages 3-5, in regulated child care (family/group family and center-based care) is \$250 a week. The government provides child care subsidies for working poor families. But, because federal and State funding for child care falls short of the need, low-income parents must pay a Family Share (co-payment) for their child care. In Suffolk County, for example, with a current 25% Family Share, a family earning \$40,000 a year would have to pay \$93.26 a week toward the \$250 cost of child care, or \$373 a month. Take a look at this monthly budget for a family of four earning \$40,000 year. Where can they reduce or eliminate spending in order to find \$373 to pay their Family Share of child care? Will they have to choose between buying food and paying for child care? Will they seek help at a food pantry? (Note: One option is to use an unregulated, possibly unsafe, illegal provider who may be cheaper)

According to one online resource, the term "role model" was first used by noted sociologist, Robert K. Merton to describe the way that people compare themselves with others who do things people aspire to or want to do well. Its general use has come to mean a "person who serves as an example of a positive behavior."

If asked, most of us could identify one or more role models who made a difference in our lives when we were growing up. We looked up to them. Our interactions with them taught us how to function in life with self-respect, or common sense, or integrity or all three. These were people who served as an example of positive behavior that we wanted to emulate.

Each of us wants to be a positive role model for the people in our lives. The Protecting God's Children® program provides us with an opportunity to fulfill that wish. Becoming an expert at identifying the warning signs of possible child molesters and taking the action to intervene in risky situations is a role we can assume that allows us to model appropriate behavior for others.

What does it take to be a positive "role model" for those around us? The first thing to remember is to be positive and confident. Learn the warning signs, pay close attention to the behavior of adults in the environment, and act confidently when you see something that causes you concern.

The second thing to remember is that taking action may not be the most comfortable thing to do, or the ordinary thing to do, but it is the right thing to do. Being willing to go against the grain and speak up when you see something that causes concern or something that seems inappropriate may not be the easy thing to do, but taking action can save children and being someone who puts the welfare of children ahead of a concern for what others will think is the right and the Christian thing to do. Remember that Jesus stood for what was right and, while some

followed Him, others jeered and scoffed at Him and conspired to stop Him. But, ultimately, those who were against Him were the catalyst for God's promise of redemption and eternal life being fulfilled for us all.

Another thing to think about is that a positive role model operates with kindness and concern for others. Noticing and communicating about the inappropriate or disquieting behavior of adults in your child's environment does not equal being mean and/or vindictive to those around you. Speak up with compassion and concern. Be assertive without being accusatory. Give others a chance to change.

A positive role model also learns how to communicate effectively and honestly without compromising the commitment to interrupt risky behavior. Take the time to learn how to let others know about risky or inappropriate behaviors without creating undue upset or anger. Become an effective communicator and you will be a very positive role model for many in your life.

Finally, pay attention to your own interactions with others—particularly children and young people. Apply the same standards of behavior to your own work and ministry that you expect from others. Listen to the concerns of others and take action to correct any behavior or address any concerns they have about how you interact with children and young people. Let others see you respond with grace and a genuine commitment to address the concern quickly and openly.

We all know that children and young people need positive role models. Adults need role models too, particularly when the role is an entirely new one. Being a protector of children is not a new role but being at the forefront of the effort to create safe environments and protect children from sexual abuse is new for most of us. We can provide that model. We can be the ones that inspire others to step up and take action to protect children. All it takes is commitment and action. It is up to you!

Getting and Not Getting the Secret

What's life's deep secret? Do we ever really understand life? Do we ever really get things right? What lies at the center of life?

These are the deeper questions that gnaw away inside of us and we are never really sure how to answer them.. Do we ever really understand what our lives are all about?

Yes and no! I suspect that most of us go through life bouncing back and forth between knowing and not knowing, between feeling steady and feeling insecure, between having days when we feel we're getting things right and having days when everything seems out of sorts.

As the Sufi mystic Rumi, once put it, we live "with a secret we sometimes know, and then not know."

I suspect we all know what that feels like. Some days, it seems, we know the secret to living and feel we are inside of things, at their heart. This may not necessarily be something we are consciously aware of, but something sensed at some deeper level. There are times when our lives make sense in a way Vaclav Havel once described. Steadiness, he suggests, lies "not in the conviction that something will turn out well, but in the certainty that something makes sense, regardless of how it turns out." There are days when we know the truth of that.

But there are also days when we aren't sure exactly what we know, when we feel outside of things, when the circle of life seems to exclude us, and we walk round the edges of love and meaning, unsure, unsteady, feeling some inexplicable guilt because we have the sense that somehow we are doing things wrongly and are not where we should be

And so we live with a secret we sometimes know, and then not. We feel steady and then unsure, strong and then vulnerable, moral and then guilty; loveable and then unworthy; we sense that we know the secret to life and then suddenly we feel we don't. Sometimes we stand inside of things and sometimes we stand outside of them.

I've always been struck by a very poignant expression in the Gospel of Mark. He tells us that Peter betrayed Jesus at his trial, ultimately cursing him in order to save himself, After that betrayal, Mark (in a stunningly cryptic statement) says simply: "Peter went outside!"

Outside of what? Obviously he is referring to much more than Peter simply stepping outside of a door and

leaving a room or a courtyard. In betraying Jesus, and in betraying himself, Peter "went outside" of something else, namely, outside all that's best inside of himself, outside of the community of life, and outside the secret of life itself.

And what is the secret of life itself?

In the Gospel of Mark, Jesus says: "To you is given the secret of the Kingdom of God, but to those outside, everything is in riddles." To whom is he referring? Who is "you"? What is the secret? What puts you inside? What puts you outside and makes the Gospel a riddle?

In Mark's Gospel, the answers to these questions are clear: You are "inside" or "outside" the true circle of understanding, not on the basis of being Jew or Gentile, of being man or woman, or of going or not going to church. Rather you are inside or outside the circle of true understanding on the basis of "getting" or "not getting" the secret. And what is the secret?

In essence, the secret to life is the cross of Christ or, as various scripture scholars and spiritual writers put it, the brokenness of Jesus on the cross, the wisdom of the cross, the invitation that lies inside the cross, and the willingness to live out the demands of the cross.

It's not easy to try to summarize all that this means. To do that, one would have to summarize all the deepest challenges within revelation, theology, and spirituality: God's unconditional love and forgiveness, God's loving presence inside of human twistedness, vulnerability as the path to intimacy, God's identification with the poor and the excluded, the necessary connection between suffering and glory, the paradoxical nature of love and life (which can only be received by giving them away), the centrality of self-sacrifice as the key to love and fidelity, and the importance of giving our lives over without resentment (of not sending the bill whenever we carry someone's cross).

There's a lot inside this secret! And when we are at our best, when we let the demands of love, truth, and fidelity take us to where we would rather not go, we know its truth and live inside of it. On those days, we know the secret of the kingdom and the Gospels make sense. But then there are days that, like Peter when he betrayed Jesus, we "go outside", outside of truth and what's best inside of us, and from that perspective life, love, truth, Jesus, and the Gospels all look like an empty riddle.


Sharing the Gospel
