In this way your fast will be the giving up of what someone else needs.

Guidelines for OLL Lenten Food Stamp Fast

Sunday, March 2 - Sunday, March 9

All participants will be invited to begin their week of fasting with a blessing at mass on the weekend of **March 1/2.** The blessing will be given at all masses that weekend and will officially begin our week of fasting in solidarity with the poor. We ask that, as much as is possible, you observe the following guidelines. Participating in the fast is symbolic, and we recognize that some may not be able to keep to the guidelines exactly (especially where there are health concerns, etc.) It is the spirit of the fast that is important, rather than how well you adhere to individual guidelines below. Let's spend the week mindful of those who do not have choices as we do.

Participation Guidelines

- 1. The Food Stamp budget is approximately \$21 per person per week. Since those on food stamps might also receive some other assistance, we will also add:
 a) a \$40 allotment per family to buy staples only (rice, canned food, etc.) as these are items a needy family would receive from a food pantry or outreach center.
 b) If there are children in your household add \$10 per child per week since school children often receive a federal free lunch program.
- 2. All food purchased and eaten during the Challenge week, including fast food and dining out must be included in the total spending.
- 3. During the Challenge, only eat food that you purchase for the project. Do not eat food that you already own (this does *not* include spices and condiments).
- 4. Avoid accepting free food from friends, family or at work.
- 5. Since part of a typical food stamp recipient's week might include a visit to a soup kitchen, you will be invited to a Soup Supper at OLL on Wednesday, March 5 at 6 PM.
- 6. Please keep track of receipts on food spending and take note of your experiences throughout the week. Whenever you go to a store to buy food bring only the cash that is in your budget. In this way you will not be able to buy more than you are supposed to.

We will end our fast on Sunday, March 9 with a "Break-fast" right after the 9:30 AM Mass.



CATHOLIC CHARITIES

Catholic Charities of the Diocese of Rockville Centre provides a wide range of services to approximately 60,000 Long Islanders each year, as it strives to bring God's healing love to the poor and vulnerable among us.

These services are designed to help people with many of their most critical needs, such as helping a senior citizen find safe and affordable housing, or providing a disadvantaged family with access to nutritious food and health care, or by developing residential services for children and adolescents who suffer from serious emotional difficulties, or helping a young, frightened, teenaged mother-to-be become prepared and equipped to be a loving and effective parent.

Catholic Charities operates 14 programs of service including more than 60 sites from Elmont to the East End and works closely with more than 100 of our parishes' social ministries, helping them develop their own local programs of service. The Catholic Ministries Appeal provides 22 percent of all dollars raised to ensure the continuation and expansion of these vital services and programs.

PASTORAL OUTREACH

Pastoral Outreach helps connect the Church on Long Island to thousands of people from diverse cultural and ethnic backgrounds. It helps bring together our youth and young adults, and ministers to those who are suffering and alone.

These programs include the Office of Hospital Ministry, where more than 300,000 people are served in our local hospitals every year, as well as the Office of Worship, the Respect Life Office and Prison Ministry. It also encompasses the Office of New Evangelization, whose ministries are designed to welcome, support and help evangelize people from many different backgrounds to our faith. In addition, it supports our young people through campus ministries and supports our adults through Renewal Services with local prayer groups and Healing Masses.

New Evangelization also supports our Mission in the Dominican Republic, which serves the religious, spiritual and health needs of more than 45,000 people. Pastoral Outreach receives 20 percent of all of the funds raised from the Catholic Ministries Appeal.

FORMATION

Formation encompasses those ministries, which are dedicated to the critical faith formation of our children and our adults. It includes the Office of Faith Formation, the Office of Deacons and the Seminary of the Immaculate Conception.

The Office of Faith Formation works closely with our parishes to help support all of their formation programs. As an example, last year 117,000 students from local public schools participated in our religious education programs. The 17,000 catechists who work directly with these youngsters are trained and supported by our Office of Faith Formation.

Within our Seminary, this year there are 42 men in formation to become priest for our Diocese or for the Diocese of Brooklyn. The Seminary also provides programs for the over 50 men enrolled in our deaconate formation program and for the laypersons and priests studying for Masters Degrees in Theology or Pastoral Studies.



Second Sunday of Lent

In March of 1953, Sir Edmund Hillary and others set up a base camp to attempt to reach the summit of Mount Everest in Nepal. For two months, they battled the conditions as they slowly made their way up the mountain. Finally, in May, Hillary and his Sherpa companion Tenzing Norgay became the first to reach the top of the world's tallest mountain. Sir Edmund left only one object on top of Mount Everest that day - a small crucifix.

Our quest to find the loving light of Jesus in our lives can be likened to a climb up the highest mountain. It isn't easy and it may take much longer than any of us could ever imagine. Still, to reach the top we continue looking toward the summit, never looking back from where we came. And as we come closer and closer to him, we become more and more like him, changing bit by bit until that light shines in us as well.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches us that Christ's transfiguration serves as strengthening the apostles' (and our) faith in anticipation of his passion. By climbing that high mountain, he has prepared for his most difficult climb up Calvary (CCC 568). Peter, James and John are privileged to make that first climb, rewarded with witnessing the Transfiguration. Consider today your climb of faith, and consider your reward. You will not look back!

Here is the story of Stephanie, one single mother struggling to find and pay for quality child care (Source: Child Care Council of Nassau)

Upon re-entering the workforce, I was a single mother with four beautiful children ranging in age from 8 months to 11 years old. All I wanted to do at this time was find a child care center for my little Danielle and return to work. My older children were attending the Freeport public school district and the after-school program (PAL), so they were set for the time being. It was extremely hard finding someone to care for Danielle because when I started to look for employment, she was about 6 months old. I remember going into the unemployment office and having to take my little one with me everyday. It was so hard, the stares, the looks, because they did not allow children in the areas where potential employees were looking for employment. I made an agreement with Danielle's dad for the days that I wanted to look for work and find child care that his sister, who lives in Hollis Queens, would care for her. That meant she had to be dropped at least 3-4 days a week in Queens.

I finally got a break when an organization hired me. I still needed to find child care for Danielle. I decided to start to look for a program that would be best for my daughter and me. I wanted to look for an affordable program that had the highest reliability and excellence, staff who would provide quality care for my child and a program where I would be comfortable leaving Danielle in their care.

I finally found a program that met my definition of good, quality childcare. One of the things that I have learned is that quality child care costs a lot of money. In order to keep Danielle in this wonderful program and to be able to pay my bills and take care of my other children as well, I took on another job. After working from 9 to 5 each day, I would pick up my daughter, make arrangements with family and friends to care for all of my children and then head off to my second job, working from 6 until midnight, fall into bed exhausted and then get up and do it again the next day.

Moral Intelligence

There are different ways of being intelligent, of being awake. Not everyone is bright in the same way.

Some people are gifted mathematically and philosophically. That's the intelligence of an Albert Einstein, an Alfred North Whitehead, a Bill Gates. Some others are gifted with emotional intelligence. You see this, for instance, in the great novelists, the Iris Murdochs, the Anne Byatts, the John Steinbecks, and the Alice Munroes, who possess an emotional grasp of things that the greatest psychologists in the world can only envy.

Then there is something that might be called practical intelligence. I saw this in some of my high school friends, young men who couldn't pass enough courses to graduate, but who are wonderfully gifted with life-skills and are the ones the rest of us lean on whenever we need to sort out our plumbing, our automobile woes, our leaking roofs, and the thousand other things that mathematics, philosophy, and literature don't equip us to handle.

There is too a certain aesthetic intelligence, that unique brightness of the artist which sometimes combines with the emotional or even the mathematical (especially in the case of music) but is often an intelligence all to itself.

Finally, there is still another kind of intelligence, moral intelligence. What is this? Sometimes we call it depth or wisdom or character. Whatever its name, moral intelligence is a sensitivity to the deeper contours within life. It is a certain grasp of those things which hold life together at its root and which must be respected so that life doesn't go sour, unravel, disintegrate, and turn against us. Moral intelligence intuits the imperatives innate within the DNA of life itself. It grasps the things we have do, and not just the things we like to do. It lays bare the hard-wiring inside the mystery of life and love.

Where does it come from? Like other forms of intelligence, it is perhaps mainly a natural endowment, a temperament, a grace given by God as a gift to the world. But, I suspect, in most cases it is also the product of something else, namely, a certain kind of suffering and humiliation. What do I mean by that?

If we look at our lives and ask ourselves: What has made us deep? What has helped us to understand the deeper things in life? If we are honest, we will have to admit that what made us deep were not our successes or achievements. These brought us glory, but not depth of character.

What brought us depth and character are the very things we are often ashamed to talk about, namely, our inferiorities - getting picked last on the school team, being bullied on the playground, some physical inadequacy, our mother's weight problem, our dad's alcoholism, an abuse inflicted upon us that we were powerless to stop, a slow-wittedness that perpetually left us out of the inner circle, our failure to achieve what we'd like to in life, a pain about our sexual orientation, an addiction we can't master, and many, many other small and big wounds and bruises that helped shape our souls.

James Hillman, our generation's maverick intellectual, speaks eloquently on this. Depth, he suggests, never comes out of our successes, but only out of our inferiorities and failures. And this, he says, gives us character: Our scars are like huge stones in a riverbed; they may do nothing but stay still and hold their ground, but the river has to take them into account and alter its flow because of them and it's precisely this which gives a river (and a face) some character.

This truth lies at the very heart of Jesus' life and message. When the disciples can't fathom or accept the crucifixion, he asks them: "Wasn't it necessary?" Isn't there a necessary connection between the humiliation of Good Friday and the glory of Easter Sunday? Isn't there an intrinsic connection between going through a certain kind of suffering and reaching a certain kind of depth?

Indeed, Jesus' struggle in the Garden of Gethsemane, his asking God three times to spare him from the pain and humiliation of being crucified, was precisely his own reluctance to accept that a certain kind of depth can only be arrived at by journeying through a certain kind of humiliation. And, in his case, he wasn't just going to be picked on by the playground bully, he was going to be hung naked before the whole world. But that was the only route to Easter Sunday and he had the moral intelligence to see it.

And what the crucifixion produced is moral wisdom. That's why the cross of Christ, as Rene Girard puts it, is the single most revolutionary moral event that has ever happened on this planet. What the cross of Christ does, as the gospels tell us, is rip away the veil the separates us from seeing inside the holy of holies.

And our own crosses and humiliations can do that for us too. They can rip away a blindness and wake us up morally.
