



Many times people are overwhelmed or fear they are too busy to get involved in parish life. The summer is a great time to explore some more and see if a particular ministry is for you! Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist



Extraordinary Ministers distribute communion at Sunday liturgy, weekday Masses and during holy days of obligation. Some ministers also choose to bring Communion to the Sick in our parish community.

What's the commitment?

There is a training offered by the Diocese of Rockville Centre in the Fall and a follow up training here at OLL. We try to schedule you based on the Mass you most frequently attend. Ministers sign up to serve on holidays, holy days and special occasions. We also offer opportunities for reflection and prayer that all are invited to and requested to be a part of throughout the year.

Children's Liturgy of the Word/Family Liturgy Committee

Our Lady of Lourdes wants young people and their families to know they are a vital and active member of the Church community! These two exciting ministries work closely together to help that happen. Children's Liturgy of the Word: Each Sunday at the 9:30 A.M. Mass, we invite young people from age four to about fourth grade to share God's Word in a special way. Pastoral Council Accepting Nominees

Pastoral Council members must have an interest and investment in the parish. Practically, this means that a nominee for the pastoral council must be a person who:

- Worships weekly in the parish and takes full part in the spiritual life of the community
- Offers their time and talent in service or ministry to this community
- Supports the parish financially in a manner appropriate to their means

Parishioners may nominate either themselves or another parishioner for the council. Applicants will be reviewed by the pastoral council nominating committee and if willing and qualified will be asked to complete a profile.

- Parishioners are appointed to the council by the current council in consultation with the pastor and pastoral team in a process of discernment. The goal of this process is to insure that the council represents the diversity of Our Lady of Lourdes and has the gifts and interests necessary to our present goals.

11th Sunday in Ordinary Time

How often have you heard the phrase "ordinary people doing extraordinary things"? Our history is filled with such people, and all around us you can see them today. There are the doctors and nurses who routinely save lives; teachers who shoulder most of the responsibility of educating our young people; or even the thousands of people who participate in countless fundraising events to try to help eradicate deadly diseases. Their calling comes from within.

Today's Gospel reading from Matthew tells of Jesus' act of selecting his twelve disciples. So filled with compassion at the sight of thousands of people who came to hear his word, he prayed for and received "shepherds for the flocks." But in the same vein as his humble beginnings, Jesus did not seek those who spoke with authority of the orthodox laws, but rather his disciples were ordinary men called to do the most extraordinary thing.

Would you answer such a call? We have, in fact, already been called! The apostles handed down the gift of love in Christ, a treasure we are entrusted with to pass down to our children and everywhere in the world open to God's word (CCC 3). If we turn to God with all of the trust and faith promised by Jesus and delivered through the Holy Spirit, we have made real the kingdom of heaven. What an extraordinary accomplishment!

Help Save a Life - Give Blood

Over **800** pints of blood are needed **EVERY DAY** to meet the needs of the patients in our Long Island area hospitals. One pint of blood can save **FIVE** lives because blood is divided into components and can be used for up to five patients with different critical needs.

BUT... We do not collect enough blood in this area to meet this need. **Blood that was available to us from Europe is no longer available.** Maintaining the blood supply has become a national problem. Only **2** people out of **100** who are **ABLE** to donate blood are actually doing it!

The need for blood is daily. It must **BE THERE** when it is needed (think about 9/11). Almost half the blood that is transfused is done on an **EMERGENCY** basis. Blood CANNOT BE STOCKPILED. Red cells are viable for 35–42 days, but platelets must be used within 5 days. Please care enough to give blood on **WEDNESDAY**, **JUNE 25th** from 3:30 to 8:30 PM in the Parish Center. To make an appointment, please call Marie at 669-5837 or just walk in the day of the drive.

Your gift of blood may mean another day of life for someone, another birthday, another anniversary, another hug, another smile. Love makes it all worthwhile.

A Call to Action on Behalf of Poor Long Islanders: Part 2

The public-policy issues below were developed on April 28th, 2008 at the MICAH/Adelphi University Conference, *Ending Poverty on Long Island: An Action Plan.* These issues are now the MICAH Agenda for addressing specific, school district, village/town, county and state public-policy issues to help poor Long Islanders make ends meet.

4. Securing Decent Pay for Decent Work

- The State should continue to expand wage supplements for the working poor by allowing telephone enrollments for Food Stamps or increasing the amount of the State Earned Income Tax Credit.
- The State should adopt a Domestic Worker's Bill of Rights.
- The Jobs with Justice Worker's Rights Board should receive interfaith support in its efforts to call attention to unfair labor practices on Long Island.
- The State should adopt Industrial Development Agency (IDA) reforms requiring that companies receiving IDA tax breaks be required to comply with fair wage and benefits, job creation and accountability standards.

5. Ensuring Health Care for Poor Long Islanders

- The State should expand the number of Child Health Plus (CHP) enrollment sites, the number of facilitated CHP enrollers and should simplify the application process with a shorter application and more than a one-year enrollment cycle.
- The State should expand Timothy's Law to require health insurance coverage parity to include Post Traumatic Stress Disorders (PTSD) and substance abuse.

6. Expanding Public Transportation for Working Long Islanders

• The State should increase funding for public buses in Nassau and Suffolk Counties so as to increase routes, frequency of bus runs and improve scheduling.

7. Funding Departments of Social Services for Success

- Nassau and Suffolk County Departments of Social Services should hire two mentors each to help clients complete their education and training programs.
- Suffolk County Department of Social Services should open one night a week to accommodate working poor people.
- The State should allow on-line courses and unsupervised homework to count as a work activity and should permit clients to enter a four year college program.
- The State should raise the basic needs Public Assistance Grant (which has remained the same since 1990) to \$491 a month, thereby restoring it to its 1990 value.
- The State should cap transfers from the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) surplus to pay for the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) at the 2007 amount (\$603 million) so that more of the TANF surplus can be used for education and training and other programs to help clients transition from welfare to work.

Measuring Ourselves in Love

When I was younger, I was pretty confident that I knew what love meant. After all, we all experience love in some way, being in love, loving someone, being loved by someone. Virtually everyone has known the love of somebody, a friend, a family member, an acquaintance.

But the older I get the more I wonder sometimes whether I, or most anyone else, has much sense of what that over-used word, love, really means? When we are honest, we sense our own distance from its full meaning. Why?

Because, the older we get, the more we also begin to know love's dark side. Too common are these experiences: We fall in love and think it will last forever, but then fall out of love, feel love go sour, feel love grow cold, see love betrayed, feel ourselves wounded by love, and wound others. Finally, even more upsetting, we all find that there are always people in our lives who are cold, bitter, and unforgiving towards us so that it is not always easy to feel love and be loving.

In the light of this reticence, I would like comment on Jesus' most important commandment: 'Love one another as I have loved you!"

We too easily read that simplistically, romantically, and in a one-sided, over-confident manner. But this command contains the most important challenge of the whole gospel and, like the deepest part of the gospel to which it is linked, the crucifixion, it is very, very difficult to imitate. Why?

It's easy to consider ourselves as loving if we only look at one side of things, namely, how we relate to those people who are loving, warm, respectful, and gracious towards us. If we rate ourselves on how we feel about ourselves in our best moments among like-minded friends, we can easily conclude both that we are loving persons and that we are measuring up to Jesus' command to love as he did.

But if we begin to look at the skeletons in our relational closets our naive confidence soon disappears: What about the people who hate us, whom we don't like? What about the people whom we avoid and who avoid us? What about those people towards whom we feel resentment? What about all those people with whom we are at odds, towards whom we feel suspicion, coldness, anger? What about those people whom we haven't been able to forgive?

It's one thing to love someone who adores you, it's quite another to love someone who wants you dead!

But that's the real test. Jesus' command to love contains a critical subordinate clause, "as I have loved you!" What was unique in the way he loved us?

Where Jesus stretches us beyond our natural instincts and beyond all self-delusion is in his command to love our enemies, to be warm to those who are cold to us, to be kind to those who are cruel to us, to do good to those who hate us, to forgive those who hurt us, to forgive those who won't forgive us, and to ultimately love and forgive those who are trying to kill us.

That command, love and forgive your enemies, more than any creedal formula or other moral issue, is the litmus-test for Christian discipleship. We can ardently believe in and defend every item in the creed and fight passionately for justice in all its dimensions, but the real test of whether or not we are followers of Jesus is the capacity or non-capacity to forgive an enemy, to remain warm and loving towards someone who is not warm and loving to us.

We shouldn't delude ourselves on this. It is easy to rationalize this away and, if we do, no doubt there will be more than enough false friends around who will furnish us with both theological and psychological arguments that will justify us in not loving our enemies. But the gospel is uncompromising: We are loving or non-loving not on the basis of how we respond to those who love us, but on the basis of how we respond to those who hate us, and are cold, hostile, and murderous toward us. That's the hard, non-negotiable truth underlying Jesus' command to love and, when we are honest, we have to admit that we are still a long ways from measuring up to that.

There's a sobering challenge in an old Stevie Nicks' song, Golddust Woman: She suggests that it's good that, at a point in life, someone "shatters our illusion of love" because far too often, blind to its own true intentions, our love is manipulative and self-serving. Too often, the song points out, we are lousy lovers who unconsciously pick our prey.

What shatters our illusion of love is the presence in our lives of people who hate us. They're the test. It's here where we have to measure up: If we can love them, we're real lovers, if we can't, we're still under a self-serving illusion.




Sharing the Gospel
