

The Most Holy Trinity

The worship center is dark; each parishioner holds an unlit candle. The pastor enters with a single lighted candle and begins lighting the candles of those at the ends of the pews. In turn, they light the candles of the people next to them, and so on. Slowly, the room is aglow in the light of a thousand candles, all lit from a single flame. As the pastor approaches the altar, we are careful to take notice that the candle he carried in has not changed in the least, and could light even another thousand candles. It is that way when we speak of God's love; no matter how often we share it, our own love grows brighter and stronger.

Through the example of one candle lighting a thousand we are able to better appreciate the Gospel. After the Resurrection, Jesus summons the eleven disciples to a mountain in Galilee. There, he gives them the Great Commission, to go out into the world and baptize all in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Jesus could have appeared to thousands, yet he knew these eleven "candles" would be capable of following his commandments and spreading his promise of eternal life.

Today is the feast of the Most Holy Trinity, a remembrance of Christ's directive of a new mission for his followers to baptize in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The Catechism of the Catholic Church tells us that this mandate is our invitation to join in the one family of God, fully united and complete (CCC 959). Two thousand years ago, eleven men set out, tasked with beginning the fulfillment of the New Covenant by bringing all who would believe into the loving arms of God. Today, turn to others and offer them the light of life.

HUNGRY LONG ISLANDERS...HOW CAN THIS BE?

Can We Afford to Call Long Island Home?

MICAH*: An Interfaith Advocacy Campaign to End Hunger & Poverty on Long Island (*Mobilized Interfaith Coalition Against Hunger)

"Do justice, love mercy, walk humbly with your God." Micah, 6:8

PROBLEM:

- Too many of our young people have been priced out of Long Island's housing market. This has made it difficult for employers to attract the best and brightest to Long Island and it has hurt parents whose children have relocated to other parts of the country where housing is more affordable.
- Long Island is experiencing a *BRAIN DRAIN* of younger workers. High prices prevent companies from recruiting/retaining workers and business owners say the lack of decent, affordable & safe housing is the #1 obstacle to Long Island's economic growth.
- Long Island has the lowest proportion of rental housing in the country.
- Long Island does not have enough kinds of housing that younger single people, middle class families, empty-nesters and many seniors need.
- Thousands of young Long Islanders are living at home with their parents or living in illegal apartments. Thousands of empty nesters and seniors are looking for a way to leave their single-family house and still stay on Long Island. And why shouldn't your grandmother be able to live with you?
- Teachers, nurses, firefighters, police officers, returning U.S. soldiers, construction workers, clerical personnel, recent college graduates, senior citizens, young families and professionals just starting out. These are the faces of the workforce who in many cases have been born on Long Island, they live and serve in our communities, but they are leaving Long Island in record numbers.

SOLUTION:

• We need a better variety of housing we can all afford. The solution is to change the mix of housing types by building more affordable apartments and townhouse communities. We, as Long Islanders will have to demand our local zoning authorities to permit new kinds of housing to be built. This is about building studio, one bedroom and two bedroom apartments for ourselves, our friends, relatives, neighbors and colleagues. It is about vibrant *SMART GROWTH* communities in which citizens can walk, bike, work, shop & enjoy their downtown areas while preserving community character & the environment, and strengthening local economies.

ACTION:

- We have to solve this critical social need. Now is the time: tell your town supervisor or village mayor that we want our kids to be able to live here and to allow more types of housing to be built.
- Stand up and say, "Yes, we want housing we can afford!

Outreach Update:

I have made many requests on behalf of Outreach in the past; and the response of this Community has always been overwhelming.

Last August, a woman came to Outreach asking for food assistance. She did not have health insurance at the time and part of the contract we made was for her to apply for Medicaid and Food Stamps. She continued to receive food assistance while her applications for Food Stamps and Medicaid were pending. In October, during one of her weekly visits to Outreach, she mentioned that she had scheduled some medical appointments, including a mammogram. Long story short, she was diagnosed with breast cancer and needed to begin treatments immediately, before any surgery could be performed. Through the holidays, Outreach continued to help her with food, with gifts for her children and money for transportation into Sloan Kettering in Manhattan. On several occasions, your financial assistance enabled Outreach to pay for the anti-nausea medication she required following chemotherapy, (until she could enroll in the drug programs offered by the pharmaceutical companies.)

At one point in the course of her treatments, it became necessary for her to have dental work. Already bald from the chemotherapy, your donations prevented her from suffering yet another indignity, that of losing her teeth with no replacements. Outreach was able to pay for replacements. Thank you. When treatments ended in the late springtime, surgery was scheduled and our client had a double mastectomy. Shortly after, she underwent additional surgery as she tested positive to carrying the BRACA Gene-a heredity gene known to be a risk factor in both ovarian and breast cancers.

Well on the road to recovery, we hope; she continues to receive food assistance from Outreach. Now she sports short, gray hair and a very positive attitude. Last week, she approached me requesting my signature on a letter to Charles Schumer. It seems that funding to Cancer Services Program which provides screening to low-income, uninsured and underinsured women is being cut drastically. Without this funding only 1 in 5 women will be screened.

Please, if your life has been touched by someone who has journeyed with cancer in any form-Please, stop by Outreach and sign a letter asking Senator Schumer to vote for continued funding for early detection screenings. The letters are at the desk in the Outreach office-it will only take a minute and your signature could give someone a choice for life.

On behalf of all those I know who have walked with cancer, Thanks.

The Many Faces of the Eucharist-Feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood Jesus by Ron Rolheiser, OMI

Christians argue a lot about the Eucharist. What does it mean? What should it be called? How often should it be celebrated? Who should be allowed to fully participate?

There are lots of views on the Eucharist:

- For some it is a meal, for others it is a sacrifice
- For some it is a ritual act, sacred and set apart, for others it is a community gathering, the more mess and kids there the better.
- For some it is a deep personal prayer, for others it is a communal worship for the world.
- For some its very essence is a coming together, a communion, of those united in a single denominational faith, while for others part of its essence is its reaching out, its innate imperative to wash the feet of those who are different from ourselves.
- For some it is a celebration of sorrow, a making present of Christ's suffering and the thus place where we can break down, for others it is the place to celebrate joy and sing alleluia.
- For some it is a ritual remembrance, a making present of the historical events of Jesus' dying, rising, ascending, and sending the Holy Spirit, for others it is a celebration of God's presence with us today.
- For some it is a celebration of the Last Supper, something to be done less frequently, for others it is God's daily feeding of his people with a new manna, Christ's body, and is something to be done every day.
- For some it is a celebration of reconciliation, a ritual that forgives and unites, for others unity and reconciliation are pre-conditions for its proper celebration.
- For some it is a vigil act, a gathering that is essentially about waiting for something else or someone else to appear, for others it is a celebration of something that is already present that is asking to be received and recognized.
- For some it is understood to make present the real, physical body of Christ, for others it is understood to make Christ present in a real but spiritual way.
- Some call it the Lord's Supper, others call it the Eucharist, others call it the Mass.
- Some celebrate it once a year, some celebrate it four times a year, some celebrate it every Sunday, and some celebrate it every day.

Who's right? In truth, the Eucharist is all of these things, and more. It is like a finely-cut diamond twirling in the sun, every turn giving off a different sparkle. It is multi-valent, carrying different layers of meaning, some of them in paradoxical tension with others. There is, even in scripture, no one theology of the Eucharist, but instead there are various complementary theologies of the Eucharist.

For instance, we already see variations among the apostolic communities as to how they understood the Eucharist, what it should be called, and how often it should be celebrated. Some early communities called it the Lord's Supper, connected its meaning very much to the commemoration of the Last Supper, and celebrated it less frequently. Whereas the apostolic community that formed around John connected its theology and practice very much to the concept of God feeding his people daily with manna and they celebrated it every day, given that we need sustenance daily.

As well, we see some of its paradoxical elements right within its central symbols, bread and the wine: Both are paradoxical: Bread is both is symbol of joy, togetherness, health, and achievement (the smell of fresh bread and the primal beauty of a loaf of bread) even as it is made up of broken kernels of wheat who had to be crushed in their individuality and be baked in fire to become that bread. Wine is both a festive drink, the drink of celebration, of wedding, even as it is crushed grapes and represents the blood of Jesus and the blood and suffering of all that is crushed in our world and in our lives.

How does one put this all together? That depends upon how one defines that.

During my theological training, I took three major courses on the Eucharist and, afterwards, decided that I didn't understand the Eucharist. But the fault was not in courses, which were excellent. The fault, which is not a fault at all but a marvel, lies in the richness of the Eucharist itself. In the end, it defies not just theology professors, but metaphysics, phenomenology, and language itself. There is no adequate explanation of the Eucharist for the same reason that, in the end, there is no adequate explanation for love, for embrace, and for the reception of life and spirit through touch. Certain realities take us beyond language because that is there very purpose. They do what words cannot do. They also are beyond what we can neatly nail down in our understanding.

And that is true of the Eucharist. Any attempt to nail down its full meaning will forever come up short because it will always eventually get up and walk away with the nail!




Teach them to pray. Teach them to share. And teach them to tell the people they met how to follow Jesus, too.
