#### El Salvador!

This year's trip to El Salvador was a wonderful success and a beautiful experience for all those who participated. We are all looking forward to next year's trip and in the meantime we aim to help our friends in Central America as much as we can. On **Saturday, September 26, and Sunday, September 27,** participants in our Mission Trip will be sharing their experiences at all Masses. We are also going to ask every parishioner to join us in helping our brothers and sisters in El Salvador.

There are many ways to be involved, but two special projects will be introduced that weekend:

- 1) Sponsor a child or elderly person in El Salvador through the Christian Foundation for Children and Aging (CFCA). Each year, CFCA hosts our trip and shows us the wonderful work they do among the poor in El Salvador. They have sent us photos and profiles of 100 children and elderly from El Salvador who need our help. Sponsorship costs \$30 per month, and helps to provide for basic nutrition, health, and education. We saw firsthand the difference sponsorship makes, and we hope that some of our OLL family will join this important work. We will have sign-up information on the 26th-27th, or you can visit CFCA's website at www.cfcausa.org.
- 2) Participate on Our Lady of Lourdes' CASA Project to build homes for people in our sister parish communities. For only \$1500, a solid and safe home can be constructed in El Salvador. Our goal this year is to build 20 homes as a parish. To fund this project, we will be selling special house-shaped piggy banks, and the "Piggy Back Project" will return to OLL! We will ask our parishioners to return their spare change (not the banks) to our special coin receptacles at the doors on the first Sunday of every month. Wouldn't it be wonderful if we could take pictures of the 20 homes we built when we go to El Salvador next year!

- Health Care

We have been inundated with talk shows, commercials, speeches and town halls about health care over the past few months. The Church has taken a strong stand on health care and it'd be helpful for each of us to consider the Church's teaching as form our own opinions at health care reform. Bishop William Murphy, our bishop, is also the Chairperson of the Bishops' Committee on Domestic Justice and Human Development. His letter, in the name of all of the bishops, might serve as a good guide for each of us.

"For decades, the Catholic bishops of the United States have been and continue to be consistent advocates for comprehensive health care reform that leads to health care for all, including the weakest and most vulnerable. The bishops want to support health care reform. We have in the past and we always must insist that health care reform excludes abortion coverage or any other provisions that threaten the sanctity of life.


As Congress begins debate on health care reform the Catholic bishops of the United States offer the following criteria for fair and just health care reform. Health care reform needs to reflect basic ethical principles. We offer these as a guide:

a truly universal health policy with respect for human life and dignity; access for all with a special concern for the poor and inclusion of legal immigrants; pursuing the common good and preserving pluralism including freedom of conscience and variety of options; and restraining costs and applying them equitably across the spectrum of payers."



# 23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

You may have heard of Patrick Henry Hughes, hopefully because of his accomplishments. A gifted piano player, trumpeter, and singer, at age twenty he has performed on such stages as the Grand Ole Opry and the Kennedy Center. But Patrick Henry is also known as the young man in the wheelchair who, with his dad, performs with his University of Louisville marching band. Not only is he confined to a wheelchair because of a birth disorder, Patrick Henry is blind. He was born without eyes, but this is how he "sees" life: "I believe God gave me blindness so that I may see the inner qualities in everyone I meet."

How do you view disabilities? Like Patrick Henry Hughes, do you view them as a gift? Is it possible to understand that in some aspects of our lives, we all have areas that could be deemed a disability? We may be blind to the needs of others, deaf to the sounds of praise from a friend, unable to express gratitude for the many gifts we receive on a daily basis. In today's reading from Mark, Jesus is presented with a blind man with a speech impediment. Pulling him out of the crowd to a solitary place, the man is healed through Jesus' touch.

Jesus' decision to lead the man away into solitude in order to heal him stresses the importance of praying without distraction. According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, Jesus always responds to a prayer offered in faith, whether healing infirmities or forgiving sins (CCC 2616). It is often difficult to listen to the wonders of God or speak to him when we are surrounded by the clamor of the world around us. We are healed by the loving touch of Jesus when we allow ourselves and our hearts to listen, see, and feel only him. 2009 Liturgical Publications Inc

# **Outreach Update**

Financial contributions donated to Outreach enable us to assist families in need. Your generosity continues to make a difference to so many families and children. Thank you for the many school supplies we received this year. Children can return to school with backpacks filled with all the supplies they required.

I would like to update the Parish on the status of a family our community has assisted through some very challenging times. In January this family of six was rushed to the hospital with carbon monoxide poisoning due to a faulty heating system. Through the donations to Outreach during the holidays, our Parish was able to contribute to the repairs of the chimney so the family could return to their home. This family has been with Outreach for two years and we have watched the youngest members of the family-twins; grow and prosper from infancy thru to the 'terrible twos.' Mom had worked part-time in a supermarket chain but was laid-off due to the recession Dad continues to work in a discount superstore. The family did not qualify for food stamps, with income slightly above the limit. Weekly, your donations helped provide diapers for the twins and the food donated to Outreach allowed the family to have the staples needed for four children: peanut butter, jelly, cereal and juice boxes. When the children were ill, you helped pay for the antibiotics; and most recently, when one of the twins required surgery to have tubes placed in his ears, your contributions helped defray the cost to the family. When Outreach received meat or fresh fruit, we would phone the familysometimes a volunteer would bring the food over if Dad was at work with the car.

As we all know, the cost of living continues to rise and for this family it has become impossible to remain on Long Island. The superstore which employs the father was able to offer him a transfer to a store in Florida. The decision was made to accept the transfer, their home was sold and throughout the summer Mom has been coming to Outreach not only for food, but also for empty boxes in which to pack their belongings. The emotional shift in Mom has been so evident since these plans have been in place. Mom is smiling, happy to have the opportunity to start over, to start fresh. Does she think life will be 'greener' on the other side of the fence? Well, mom has hope again-with the sale of the house, they will be able to clear out some debt and have a small amount for a down payment on another house in Florida. The kids are excited, anticipating this adventure!

Two weeks ago Mom came to Outreach to pick up food and boxes. She was distraught. She had a report from her doctor. She had had an MRI earlier in the week and has been diagnosed with a brain tumor. The volunteers in the office that day cried with our client. We listened and when we could all breathe again, we started planning and offering advice: delay the closing on your house, get a second opinion, don't do anything in haste! At a time when she is most vulnerable, we hate to see her go.

The family will be moving in two weeks. Mom has sought out a second and third opinion and she has been advised to remain under that care of a doctor. She will follow up with a neurologist and surgeon in Florida, after her family is settled. School records for the two older boys have been forwarded to an elementary school in Florida. Her husband has been transferred and the family needs to be together, now more than ever. Truly, Hope is a gift and in your generosity, you have given, many times over the gift of hope to this family. Please continue to remember them in your prayers, as their journey continues.

# The Struggle to Love

After his wife died, Jacques Maritain published her journals. In the preface to that book, Raissa's Journal, he talks about her death, brought on by a stroke, and then gives this commentary:

"But there is still something else, which is not easy to express and which, nevertheless, I want very much to add. This concerns God's mode of action. At a moment when everything collapsed for both of us, and which was followed by four agonizing months, Raissa was walled up in herself by a sudden attack of aphasia. Whatever progress she made during several weeks by sheer force of intelligence and will, all deep communication remained cut off. And subsequently, after a relapse, she could barely articulate words. In the supreme battle in which she was engaged, no one here on earth could help her, myself no more than anyone else. She preserved the peace of her soul, her full lucidity, her humor, her concern for her friends, the fear of being a trouble to others, and her marvelous smile (that unforgettable smile with which she said thank-you to Pere Riquet after Extreme Unction) and the extraordinary light of her wonderful eyes. To everyone who came near her, she invariably gave (and with what astonishing silent generosity during her last two days when she could only breathe out her love) some sort of impalpable gift which emanated from the mystery in which she was enclosed, And throughout that time she was being implacably destroyed, as if by the blows of an axe, by that God who loved her in his terrible fashion, and whose love is only 'sweet' in the eyes of saints, or of those who do not know what they are talking about."

God's love is sweet only to those who are already saints and to those who do not know what they are talking about. That is true not just of God's love, but of all love.

Love isn't easy, except in our daydreams. We do not even need to look at the superficiality of the cheaper romantic novels or movies to see the truth of that. It suffices to go to church regularly: I go to mass every day and I go there with good people - who are sincere, committed, honest, and full of faith. But they (along with myself) are also human and thus, as we stand together in a circle of faith, we are not always the idyllic picture of harmony and love of which our church hymns speak. We may be gathered in faith, but we are human and we cannot but feel certain things in each other's presence: jealousy,

irritation, hurt, paranoia, distrust, the sense of not being fully valued. And so beneath our rhetoric of love we also feel tension, distance, and even hostility sometimes. We sing brave songs that proclaim how open our hearts are and how we welcome everyone into this space, but invariably there are parts of us that don't quite mean those words, at least as they apply to some people.

And this isn't an anomaly; it's true for all congregations, of every gathering, except those where everyone is already fully a saint. Love, this side of eternity, is not easy, at least not if we try to actually embrace everyone and not just our own kind.

The older we get, the more we sense what love actually demands. It isn't easy to say the words "I love you" and actually back that up.

What does it mean to love someone? I'm pretty cautious now about what kind of words I put around that. Maybe I would use just two words, fidelity and respect. Love means keeping your word, staying with a relationship and not walking away. And love means fully respecting someone else, not violating anyone's freedom, and positively blessing and helping others to grow according to their own internal dictates. What we actually feel when we do those things is sometimes less than warm, but love, as we know, is not a question of feeling but of fidelity.

And partly that is gift, something from beyond us, from a God who can do for us what we cannot do for ourselves, namely, remain together inside of family and community. In the end, that is what church and Eucharist are meant to do:

On the night before he died, Jesus sat down with his disciples and what he found there was what we too find whenever we go to church, a sincere bunch of people struggling to not let the jealousies, irritations, self-preoccupations, and wounds of life drive them apart. We come to church and to the Eucharist to ask God to do for us what we cannot do for ourselves, love each other.

Maritain is right: Love is only sweet for those who are already saints and for those who are danger-ously naive. Since we are neither, it's good to be humble, admit our struggle, and to go to those places that can do for us what we cannot do for ourselves.
