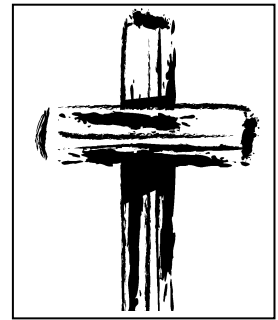

PAPAL/CONCLAVE FUN FACTS

As we get ready for the conclave, I thought it would be nice to look at some facts concerning the Pope.

Titles of the Pope

His Holiness, Bishop of Rome, Vicar of Christ, Successor of the Prince of the Apostles, Supreme Pontiff of the Universal Church, Primate of Italy, Archbishop and the Metropolitan of the Roman Province, Sovereign of the State of the Vatican City, Servant of the Servants of God.

Which pope reigned the longest and the shortest?

Peter reigned the longest, 34 years (33 A.D. to 67 A.D.) while Pope Stephen II reigned the shortest, 2 days (March 23 – March 25, 752).

How long has the Church gone without a Pope, while elections were taking place?

The longest vacancy in the Holy See was 2 years, 9 months, and 2 days (from 1268 – 1271). After the death of Pope Clement IV, the Cardinal electors began to disagree and politics became more and more important. The exasperated people eventually locked up the Cardinals and began to starve them! Soon the doors burst open and the Cardinals came out, a few pounds lighter but having elected Pope Gregory X.

Who is the first and last Pope to resign?

Before the resignation of Pope Benedict XVI, the last Pope to resign was Gregory XII in 1415. The first Pope to resign was Pope Saint Celestine V. Pope Saint Celestine, originally a hermit, reluctantly accepted the papacy “for the good of the Church” but couldn’t stand the pressures of the office and after a few months resigned and happily went back to being a happy hermit.

Who is “in charge” before a new Pope is elected?

The time between the death or resignation of a Pope and the election of the new Pope is called the “interregnum”. This time period is governed by rules established by Pope John Paul II (in the document “Universi Dominici Gregis”. These rules were modified by Pope Benedict in 2007. During this time, the most important person is the “camerlengo”. The camerlengo is Cardinal Tarcisio Bertone. The camerlengo administers the Vatican property and money. During this interregnum time, he reports to the College of Cardinals. The camerlengo organizes the conclave which will elect the new Pope.

Who is permitted in the conclave?

All Cardinals under 80 years of age when a Pope resigns or dies have the right to vote for the next Pope. However, a Cardinal who had resigned and joined Napoleon Bonaparte attempted to enter the conclave in 1800 but was turned away. Once inside the conclave, an elector may not leave except because of serious illness or other grave reasons acknowledged by a majority of the Cardinals.

Also permitted in the conclave are nurses for infirmed Cardinals, two medical doctors, religious priests who can hear confessions in various languages, the secretary of the College of Cardinals, the master of Papal liturgical celebrations with two masters of ceremonies and two religious attached to the Papal sacristy, and an assistant chosen by the Cardinal Dean. Also permitted are a suitable number of persons for preparing and serving meals and for housekeeping. All must swear absolute and perpetual secrecy concerning the election of the Pope.

Who are the Cardinal electors?

All Cardinals under 80 years of age when the Pope dies or resigns have the right to vote for the next Pope. As of February 11, 2013, there are 118 Cardinal electors. The maximum number of Cardinals has changed over the years. It was set at 70 by Pope Sixtus V in 1586. In 1970, Pope Paul VI reformed the College of Cardinals by increasing the number of electors to 120, not counting those over the age of 80.

What happens on the first day of the conclave?

On the morning the conclave begins, the Cardinal electors celebrate Mass in St. Peter's Basilica. In the afternoon, they gather in the Pauline Chapel in the Apostolic Palace and solemnly process to the Sistine Chapel. The Cardinals take an oath to observe the rules laid down, especially those concerning secrecy.

They also swear not to support interference in the election by any secular authorities or "any group of people or individuals who might wish to intervene in the election of the Roman pontiff." Finally, the electors swear that whoever is elected will carry out the "munus Petrinum" of pastor of the universal church" and will "affirm and defend strenuously the spiritual and temporal rights and liberty of the Holy See." After the oath is taken, everyone not connected with the conclave is ordered out with the Latin words "*Extra omnes*": "Everybody out!" The Sistine Chapel is then closed to unauthorized persons by the camerlengo.

After everyone else leaves, an ecclesiastic chosen earlier by the College of Cardinals gives a meditation "concerning the grave duty incumbent on them and thus on the need to act with right intention for the good of the universal church, "*solum Deum prae oculis habentes*"([having only God before your eyes). When he finishes, he leaves the Sistine Chapel with the master of Papal liturgical ceremony so that only the Cardinal electors remain. If they wish, the Cardinals can immediately begin the election process.

How does the balloting take place?

The regulations for balloting are very detailed to eliminate any suspicion of electoral fraud. Three "scrutineers" (vote counters) are chosen by lot from the electors, with the least senior Cardinal deacon drawing the names. He draws three additional names of Cardinals (called *infirmarii*) who will collect the ballots of any Cardinals in the conclave who are too sick to come to the Sistine Chapel. A final three names are drawn by lot to act as revisers, who review the work done by the scrutineers. Each morning and afternoon, new scrutineers, *infirmarii* and revisers are chosen by lot.

The electors use rectangular cards as ballots with the words *Eligo in summum pontificem* ("I elect as supreme pontiff") printed at the top. Each Cardinal, in secret, prints or writes the name of his choice on the ballot in a way that disguises his handwriting. One at a time, in order of precedence, the Cardinals approach the altar with their folded ballot held up so that it can be seen. After kneeling in prayer for a short time, the Cardinal rises and swears, "I call as my witness Christ the Lord who will be my judge, that my vote is given to the one who before God I think should be elected." He then places the ballot in a silver and gilded bronze urn shaped like a wok with a lid. The first scrutineer shakes the egg-shaped urn to mix the ballots. The last scrutineer counts the ballots before they are unfolded. If the number of ballots does not correspond to the number of electors, the ballots are burned without being counted and another vote is immediately taken. If the number of ballots does match the number of electors, the scrutineers, who are sitting at a table in front of the altar, begin counting the votes.

The first scrutineer unfolds each ballot, notes the name on a piece of paper and passes the ballot to the second scrutineer. He notes the name and passes the ballot to the third scrutineer, who reads it aloud for all the Cardinals to hear. If there are two names on a single ballot, the ballot is not counted. The last scrutineer pierces each ballot with a threaded needle through the word "Eligo" and places it on the thread. After all the ballots have been read, the ends of the thread are tied together and the ballots thus joined are placed in a third urn. The scrutineers then add up the totals for each candidate. Finally, the three revisers check both the ballots and the notes of the scrutineers to make sure that they performed their task faithfully.

The ballots and notes (including those made by any cardinal) are then burned. Special chemicals are added to make the smoke white or black. Since 1903, white smoke has signaled the election of a Pope; black smoke signals an inconclusive vote. The only written record of the voting is given to the new Pope and then placed in the archives in a sealed envelope that may be opened by no one unless the Pope gives permission.

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4th Sunday of Lent

Last October forecasts were predicting higher pork prices in the spring and summer, based on a larger than normal sow slaughter in the fall. Market analysts viewed the trend with some trepidation. They saw the greater than average weekly slaughter as a sign of some herd liquidation, a result attributed to the higher feed prices brought about by last summer's drought. With pork producers unwilling to foot the bill for the increased cost of feeding, there was a surge in animals brought to market. While consumers realized an initial benefit with lower prices in the fall and winter, the lack of feeder animals in the production pipeline means higher prices at the grocery store this spring. The Easter ham may be a little more expensive this year.

This weekend's Gospel is so familiar that most of us could probably relay the events the parable recounts by heart. The younger son ends up hiring himself out to a hog farmer, a particularly despicable trade in the cultural context of Jesus' time, since swine were considered unclean according to Jewish law. In his suffering the young man longed to eat the food that he was feeding to the pigs. He finally came to his senses, realizing that he needed to change his life. His profligate spending and former life of excess had brought him to a low point from which he needed to recover.

The economic situation of the past few years might serve as a reminder to all of us that life is more than a healthy bank account. A year ago spring, it looked like farmers would have a bumper crop. Then the drought came, affecting food prices and a lot more. Even when we think we have it all, we are still dependent. In the Gospel, the younger son turned back to his father in his need. The older son needed to turn back to his father because he had forgotten that he was always there.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

August 1, 2013 is the deadline for certain organizations in the Diocese such as Catholic Charities and Catholic Health Services of Long Island to comply with the HHS mandate that they provide free artificial contraception and abortifacient medications as part of their compliance with the Affordable Care Act. Without being specific, indications from the Obama Administration are that they will no longer listen to our claims or those who share our religious and conscience convictions.

The latest Administration pronouncements were a disappointment. After a week of analyzing this latest proposal from the Administration, Cardinal Timothy Dolan of New York, President of the US Conference of Catholic Bishops, expressed our willingness to continue to try to convince the government that the objectively inadequate “accommodation” from the HHS continues to fall far short of the mark.

To me, the major problem is in the very word the Administration uses: **accommodation**. The state is not the giver of rights, especially religious freedom. We as citizens possess the right to religious freedom without government pronouncement and, in truth, the Administration cannot “accommodate” what is already ours. We should not be treated as if we are second class citizens because we disagree with the government’s new and arbitrary insistence that all of us have to follow their prescriptions despite our religious beliefs and our right to freedom of conscience. Those rights are God-given, not state-granted. Every person and every religious institution already has from God what is guaranteed in our Constitution and Bill of Rights: freedom of religion and of conscience.

Now in the middle of Lent I write to you to ask you first of all to pray that God will protect us and our God-given rights as persons and as a Church. Second, I invite you to stay informed and be ready to respond to our calls for help as needed.

Keep your eye on the website of the US Bishops www.usccb.org as well as our news website www.licatholic.org to keep up-to-date and find concrete ways for concerted action. To get involved, please consider joining grass roots advocacy groups forming in parishes across the Diocese, such as Catholics for Freedom of Religion www.catholicsforfreedomofreligion.com. I encourage you to consider participation in such a group. Let our Senators and your Congressperson know that you and I have not lost interest. Tell them we are resolute in insisting on this most basic freedom, the freedom of religious belief and the protection of conscience. To contact your US Senators and Representatives, go to the website of the National Committee for a Human Life Amendment www.nchla.org. Send an email to your Representatives to demand the overturning of the HHS mandate. Plans are also being made for the Second Fortnight for Freedom that will take place this summer. More details about the Fortnight will be forthcoming.

Continue to pray that what is ours by right will be recognized and honored for the good of all. And continue to stand together. Your witness is needed now more than ever.

During the fast, each participant will set aside one non-perishable food item every day and put it in a specific location in their home.

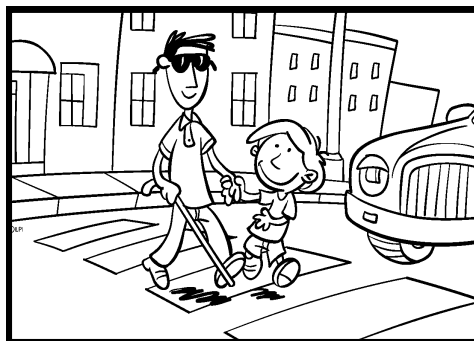

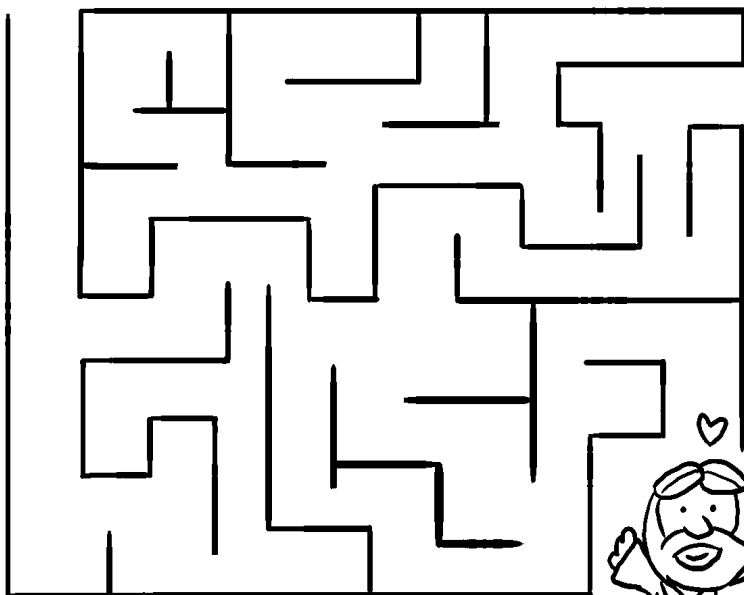
