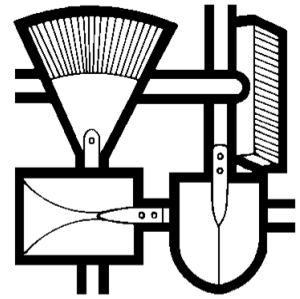

Dear Parishioners:

As you know, one of our parishioners, **Fr. David Atanasio**, was ordained a priest for our Diocese last weekend and celebrated his Mass of Thanksgiving here at Our Lady of Lourdes. Let us continue to pray for Fr. Dave as he begins his priestly ministry. His first assignment will be St. Patrick in Bay Shore, so he'll still be a neighbor!

While Fr. David's vocation was certainly nurtured by his family, our Parish family here at Our Lady of Lourdes played a role, as well. As a Parish, we should be very proud of our prayerful support and example over the years for David's vocation. I also call to mind that Fr. John Sureau was ordained just a couple of years ago, as well. Our Lady of Lourdes family has done a wonderful job in nurturing vocations. Let's keep up the good work!

I think the ordination of Fr. David reminds us that God continues to call people to serve him as a priest, religious Sister or Brother or deacon. I especially encourage young men to consider a vocation to the priesthood. I have been a priest for 30 years and if I had a chance to do it all over again, I would be a priest again in a heartbeat. I have loved being a priest and God has blessed me so very much over the years. I believe that God is still calling people to the priesthood; I am not sure that we are listening as much. Keep praying for an increase in vocations to the priesthood, diaconate and religious life.

Today, we celebrate the great feast of *Corpus Christi*: the Body and Blood of Christ. The feast highlights perhaps the greatest gift that Jesus gave us: the gift of Himself in the Eucharist. When we receive Holy Communion at Mass, we receive the actual Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Christ. And, since we are what we eat, by receiving the Eucharist, the Body and Blood of Christ, we become more and more like Christ.

The saints point out the importance of the Eucharist. As St. Thomas Aquinas said, "The proper effect of the Eucharist is the transformation of man into God." St. Pope Pius X said, "Holy Communion is the shortest and surest way to heaven." That is why St. Pope Pius X lowered the age of receiving Holy Communion from about age 12 to age 8, precisely because he wanted more and more people to receive the Eucharist, Holy Communion.

As we celebrate the Feast of Corpus Christi, let us pray that we will grow in a deeper appreciation of the gift of the Eucharist and become more and more like Christ over the years.

Remember: Together, we can do something beautiful for God.

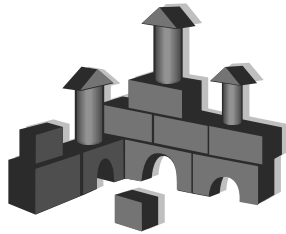

Blood Drive

On **Monday, June 30**, Our Lady of Lourdes Parish will hold a BLOOD DRIVE from 3:15pm to 9:15pm. The Drive will be held in the **Parish Center**. All eligible donors are strongly urged to give blood.

What is Blood?

Blood is composed of cells suspended in a liquid. These cells - red cells, white cells and platelets - account for 45% of the volume of blood. The remaining liquid portion is the plasma, from which therapeutic fractions and derivatives are made.

- Donors must be between the ages of 16 and 75.
- Healthy 16 year old individuals can donate with written parental consent (forms available at donation site).
- Healthy individuals over 75 can donate if they have written permission from their physician dated within one year of their donation.
- Donor must weigh at least 110 lbs.
- Donor must be in good health.
- There must be 56 days between whole blood donations.

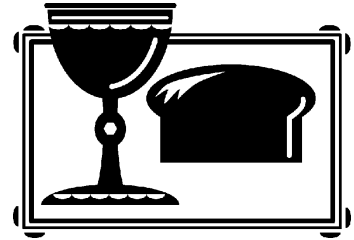

The Body of Christ

The distribution of communion has seldom changed. In the earliest Christian centuries, the faithful simply took the bread and cup in hand as at any meal. The Church in the middle ages reserved the communion cup for the clergy. The laity, if they received communion at all, were limited to the reception of the host on the tongue. Now, for the first time in history, the Church formally offers the option of taking communion on the tongue or in the hand.

No matter which method we choose, reverence for the Eucharist should guide us. Those who choose communion in the mouth experience the gift of God unmediated by the touch of their own hand. Those who choose communion in the hand see God's gift in hands which serve others. Either way, we come to the table like beggars with open mouths and open hands - not taking the food ourselves but begging it from another human being.

Too often we rush this intimate moment. Sometimes we resemble fast food more than banquet.

Think of taking communion in five distinct parts: positioning, looking, proclaiming, responding and taking.

First the worshiper gets into position. If you're distributing communion, wait for the next person to stop walking. If you're receiving, take a moment to prepare.

Next, look at the bread or the cup. And look at each other. The two of you are the mystery you are about to proclaim.

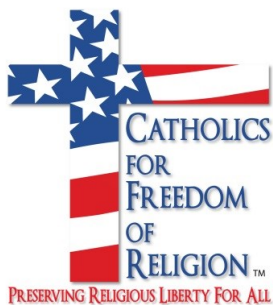
Then the minister proclaims the mystery: The Body of Christ! The Blood of Christ! (Say it with an exclamation point!) Christ who existed before existence, Christ the eternal Word who became flesh in Bethlehem, Christ whose flesh and blood were nailed to a cross, Christ whose body rose from the dead in a new form, Christ who left his body and blood in the Eucharist, Christ whose body *we are* - this is the Christ we proclaim.

Amen! Respond with faith, joy and hope. Imagine you're saying "Thank you" (Eucharist) for the gift you've always wanted, saying "I love you" to the one you love the most, saying "I believe" to a world confused by sin.

Then, only then, take communion. Join in communion with the body of Christ, risen and present all around you.

The Body of Christ. Amen.

At the May 13, 2014 National Catholic Prayer Breakfast, Robert P. George told Catholics, "The days of acceptable Christianity are over. The days of comfortable Catholicism are past."

He warned that a "price is demanded" of all committed believers, as mainstream America registers its preference for Catholics who might go to Mass but do not embrace the totality of the Church's teachings — or those who know the Church's teaching but prefer safety in their silence.

"In other words, a tame Catholic who is ashamed of the Gospel is socially acceptable," said George, even as he called on his audience to "take risks" and follow Christ's words to "take up thy cross and follow me." "To believe in the Gospel is to make oneself a marked man or woman," he said. Read more here:

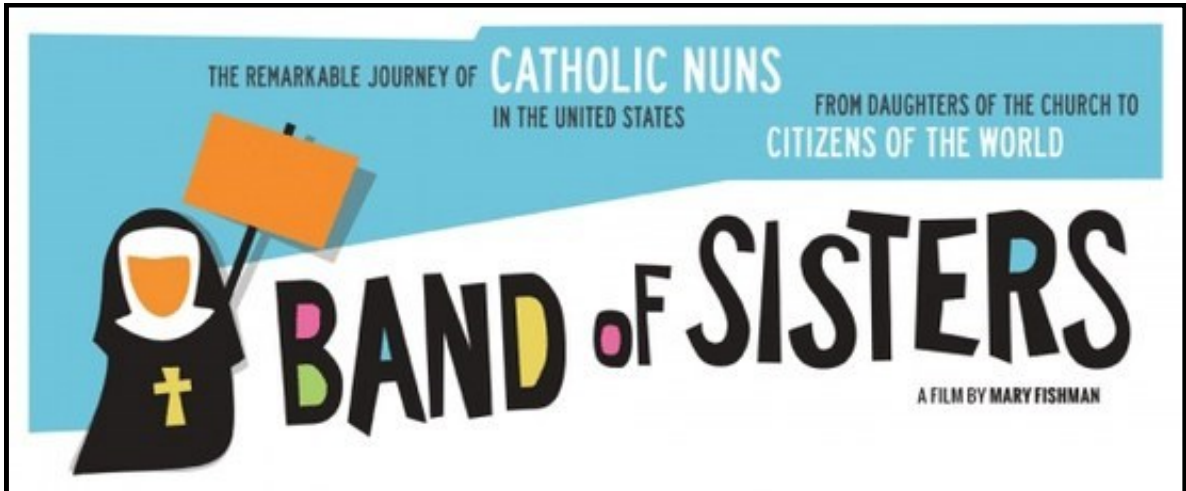
