Advent-A time to Recalculate

In July of 2017, my wife, Maria, and I went on vacation with another couple (a deacon and his wife) to Italy. It was the first time that all four of us had been to this beautiful country. We planned a two week visit to Rome (including the Vatican of course!), Assisi and Cornacchi which is in the Tuscany region of Italy. Although we had planned every detail of our trip, one thing that we were keenly aware of was that none of us spoke or were able to read in Italian. Thankfully, we were able to figure out how to navigate our lack of knowledge about the language for the most part in two ways. First, we were pleasantly surprised that many people in Italy spoke at least enough English so we could communicate with them. This however was not always the case! This is where we turned for assistance to a modern invention called Google Translator!

After leaving our first destination, Rome, where we had no need of a car, we went to the train station in Rome for the next part of our journey where we rented a car. Since we had zero knowledge of the road systems, including the fact that we could not read the road signs, our only alternative was to download an international map onto our old and outdated Garmin GPS system. For the most part, this worked out very well. However, there were times when we made a wrong turn and usually after traveling for a couple of miles down the road, the Garmin would give us a voice command which said "recalculating". This became the joke of the trip as every so often, our conversation was interrupted with the message "recalculating" which meant we made the wrong turn. We had to go back to the prior fork in the road and go in another direction.

As previously mentioned, the couple that we travelled with was a deacon and his wife. The four of us for several years had given a weekend retreat at the Seminary in Huntington for the new incoming formation class (called aspirants) and their wives. These weekends were tremendously spiritual, fun and gratifying as we were able take the first steps with these men and their wives on a very new and lifelong journey that they committed to. While in Italy, we decided that we would focus the next retreat that we were going to do which was only a few weeks after our return, on the theme of "recalculate". These aspirants and their wives were committing to a new and very different life, one centered on Jesus. The were committing to a new direction in their lives.

During Advent, Our Lord offers us an opportunity to stop and recalculate our lives. In other words, it is a time to stop, listen and refocus our lives on Jesus. Matthew Kelly, a Catholic author and speaker, states the same thing in a different way. He says, "we must from time to time step back and look at what we are doing. We must "check our connection" because when we get disconnected from God, we get disconnected from ourselves".

All successful athletes have a vision. Tiger Woods, one of the most amazing and successful golfers of all time, would stand and see the flight of the ball, the trajectory, fly through the air and land at its intended destination before he even took the shot. Prayer allows us to have this connection, this peace, this vision for the life that God intends for us to have.

The question that we need to ask ourselves is are we sleep walking through our lives or are we being watchful and vigilant. Is our life one of rejoicing in the Lord or are we simply rejoicing in the things of this material world that we cannot take with us.

Advent is a time of waiting and hope. It is a time when we are invited into a peacefulness and silence so we can hear God's voice and His presence. Since there are so many distractions in our lives, we need the help of God to reconnect to His ways.

St. Paul gives us some very practical advice in our second reading this weekend in his first letter to the Thessalonians. He tells us three things. First, "Rejoice always". Second is to "pray without ceasing" and third is "in all circumstances give thanks for this is the will of God". Fr. Richard Rohr says that these things are not easy to do however they are both necessary and they are interconnected. You cannot rejoice always unless you pray without ceasing and unless you are ready to be grateful! Because of so much negativity in the world, we need to make the deliberate first step to consciously pray, to surrender to God. This means to recalculate the direction of our lives, to reconnect to God. Once we do that, the rejoicing and a spirit of gratitude will naturally follow. Advent is a wonderful time to make the commitment to change! God only knows how badly we all need it!
