Dear Parishioners:

It is hard to believe that we are at the 2nd Sunday of Advent already! I just wanted to highlight a few Advent Activities. This coming Wednesday, **December 8**, is the **Feast of the Immaculate Conception**. It is a holy day obligation. Masses are on Tuesday, December 7 at 5:00pm and Wednesday, December 8 at 8:30am, 12:10pm and 7:30pm. You may recall that when our Blessed Mother, Our Lady of Lourdes, appeared to St. Bernadette in Lourdes, France, she identified herself by saying, "I am the Immaculate Conception". Thus, this holy day carries special meaning for our parish.

We are starting a new spiritual opportunity here at Our Lady of Lourdes. Starting Tuesday, Dec. 14, we will begin **Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament** <u>every</u> **Tuesday from 12:30pm – 8:00pm**. In the past we have had the opportunity for Exposition/Adoration every 1st Saturday of the month. Now we will have the opportunity to encounter our Lord every Tuesday. Please stop by! So many of the saints have spoken about the importance of praying before the Lord in the Blessed Sacrament. Even if you are working, we now have the opportunity to spend time before the Lord in the Blessed Sacrament.

Also, on Tuesday, **December 14, at 7:00pm**, we will have a special prayer experience during Exposition: the *ADVENT STATIONS*. As you know, we pray the Stations of the Cross during Lent. The Stations of the Cross help us to focus on the suffering and death of Jesus for our sins. Likewise, these *ADVENT STATIONS* are a meditative prayer focusing on the coming of Christ at Christmas, the fulfillment of the Old Testament prophecies. In the midst of all the hustle and bustle of Christmas, spend some time in prayer to prepare for the coming of the Savior.

Planning ahead, don't forget to take advantage of the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Our sinfulness can act as a weight which drags us down and prevents us from drawing closer to Christ. The Sacrament of Reconciliation (confession) allows the Lord to remove that weight (our sins) from us and helps us to draw closer to Christ. On **Monday, December 20 from 3:00pm – 8:00pm**, a priest will be available to hear confessions. Stop by to receive the grace of that sacrament.

In November 2013, Pope Francis published a pastoral exhortation, *Evangelii Gaudium (The Joy of the Gospel)*. In the pastoral exhortation, Pope Francis wrote: "I invite all Christians, everywhere, at this very moment, to a renewed personal encounter with Jesus Christ, or at least an openness to letting Jesus encounter them; I ask all of you to do this unfailingly each day." Let that be your Advent resolution: to have a personal encounter with Jesus Christ.



Adoration - Extended Hours Jesus is inviting you! Will you come?

The church teaches that the Eucharist is the Summit and Source of the Christian's life. So, in addition to Holy Mass, a special way to spend time with Jesus in the most intimate of ways - one on one- is in Eucharistic Adoration. Besides having Nocturnal Adoration the first Saturday of each month from 6pm to 10pm in the church, we will be having extended hours of Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament on Tuesdays only. This will start Tuesday, December 14th from 12:30pm to 8:00pm each week in the Church. Some may say, why do I have to go to adoration, I can stay home and pray. You can pray at home but here is what Bishop Robert Barron says so beautifully about adoration in **Catholicism, A Journey to the Heart of Faith**: "Adam, the first man, we hear walked in easy fellowship with God in the cool of the evening and spoke to Him as to a friend. This ordering of Adam to God meant that our first parent was effortlessly caught up in adoration. The term 'adoration' comes from the Latin adoratio, which in turn is derived from ad ora (to the mouth). To adore, therefore, is to be mouth to mouth with God, properly aligned to the divine source, breathing in God's life. When one is in the stance of adoration, the whole of one's life – mind, will, emotions, imagination, sexuality – becomes ordered and harmonized, much as the elements of a rose window arrange themselves musically around a central point." This happens when seated in prayer before the Blessed Sacrament.

Eucharistic Adoration is when the Sacred Host is placed in a container called a monstrance and placed upon the altar. People come and pray before the Lord Himself, exposed on the altar, truly present in the Eucharist; body, blood, soul and divinity. Both the young and the old are being invited to adoration each week. We want to make sure that we have at least two people in the church at all times adoring the Lord so that He is never left alone. Feel free to stop by anytime on Tuesday to pray but if you have a specific time or hour between 12:30pm and 8:00pm that you want to do adoration each week, please call Josephine at 631-214-9736. She can put you down for that specific time so we know we definitely have someone for that particular hour. Most people usually come the same time each week to pray so if that is the case, please feel free to call Josephine.

What do we do if there is a snow storm? When we have inclement weather, please call the parish office at 631-661-3224 ext.0, or log onto the parish website to check if adoration has been canceled.

Our journey through this life is to lead us to a deep intimacy with God. He wants to prepare us for eternal life. What helps us tremendously in this is spending time before the Blessed Sacrament or, in other words, Eucharistic Adoration. One may say, I don't have time for this, I am too busy. Yes, we are all very, very busy but we all make time for the things we have to do and love to do. Christ, who is truly present in the Eucharist, touches our heart and soul and we never leave adoration of the Blessed Sacrament the same (even if we feel we are getting nothing out of it).

What happens during Adoration: Prayer brings us into union with God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. In prayer, we allow our Saviour to touch and fulfill the longing, desire, thirst and hunger in our hearts for love and acceptance. In prayer, the saints experienced this and so can we because we follow and love the same God. The Holy Scriptures remind us that Jesus is the same yesterday, today and forever. The Jesus who said over 2000 years ago that He came to heal the broken hearted, set the captives free and bring recovery of sight to the blind is the same Jesus who is with us today in the Blessed Sacrament. Therefore, let us respond to the Lord's invitation and come to Eucharistic Adoration each week. Let us open our hearts fully to Him because, when we do, we fall more in love with the One who is in love with us, making our triune God; Father, Son and Holy Spirit, the center of our hearts and lives.

When we take time to sit, pray and gaze upon the Blessed Sacrament, we realize that the Eucharist is about humility. It is God almighty choosing to be a prisoner of love in the Eucharist for our sake. God longs for us to come to Him, sit before Him, be with Him and let Him love us. In the gospels, Jesus heals the blind. What is the blindness that exists in you and me? Sitting before the Blessed Sacrament in Adoration allows Jesus the time to surface our blindness and begin to heal it. The blindness of bias, prejudice, arrogance, lust, selfishness, self reliance, etc. Sometimes we don't see these things in ourselves but, the more we spend time with Jesus, He opens our eyes and then we can place these before him and allow Him to transform our hearts. St. John Vianney writes, "When we go before the Blessed Sacrament let us open our heart; our good God will open His. We shall go to Him; He will come to us, the one to ask, the other to receive. It will be like a breath passing from One to the other. What delight we find in forgetting ourselves that we may seek God."

Below are the Tuesday dates when adoration will end a little earlier because of other events happening in the church. Otherwise, all the other Tuesdays of the year will be 12:30pm to 8:00pm.
