

Christmas 2022

To the People of God of the Diocese of Rockville Centre:

Merry Christmas to you and your families!

In union with our Holy Father Pope Francis, and in a non-judgmental spirit of mercy, humility and charity I invite everyone who will be present at our Christmas Masses, or watching our Christmas Masses via the Catholic faith Network or CBS, or not present at all: If your life has been far from the Catholic Mass and Eucharist, I invite you with Pope Francis to return.

I invite you to experience the power and liberation of Christ's mercy and forgiveness in the Sacrament of Penance and to cross the bridge into the full practice of your Catholic Faith through a radical fidelity to the Sunday Mass and an ever-deepening love for the Holy Eucharist.

Perhaps you are not a Catholic and yet have some mysterious attraction to the Catholic Mass and the Eucharist.

You are not alone! Many saints - I think of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, the pioneering American Catholic educator and convert - had the same experience and were drawn to enter the Church through their intuitive experience of the real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist in our parish churches! Be open to the Eucharistic movement of the Holy Spirit in your life!

Our celebration of Christmas 2022 occurs this year as every Catholic diocese does, every catholic parish, every Catholic hospital, university, and institution in the United States is engaged in evangelizing *Eucharistic Revival*.

What doe we mean by the phrase "Eucharistic revival" and why is it so important for our celebration of Christmas?

What does a love for the Eucharist and an openness to being a 21st Century Eucharistic missionary have to do with our celebration of Christmas 2022?

Pope Francis points out the relationship between the Birth of Christ and the Holy Eucharist and the Mass. The very word Bethlehem means "house of Bread".

Pope Francis states: "Bethlehem is the turning point that alters the course of history. There God, in the *house of bead*, is born in a *manger*. It is as if he wanted to say: 'Here I am, as your food.' He does not take, but gives us to eat; he does not give us a mere thing, but his very self. In Bethlehem, we discover that God does not take life, but gives it. To us, who from birth are used to taking and eating, Jesus begins to say: 'Take and eat. This is my body'. (Matthew 26:26) The tiny body of the Child of Bethlehem speaks to us of a new way to live our lives: not by devouring and hording, but by sharing and giving. God makes himself small so that he can be our food. By feeding on him, the bread of life, we can be *reborn in love*, and break the spiral of grasping and greed. From the 'house of bread', Jesus brings us back home, so that we can become God's family, brothers and sisters to our neighbors. Standing before the manger, we

understand that the food of life is not material riches but love, not gluttony but charity, not ostentation but simplicity. The Lord knows that we need to be fed daily. That is why he offered himself to us every day of his life: from the manger in Bethlehem to the Upper Room in Jerusalem. Today too, on the altar, he becomes bread broken for us; he knocks at our door, to enter and eat with us (cf. Revelation 3:20). At Christmas, we on earth receive Jesus, the bread from heaven. It is a bread that never grows stale, but enables us even now to have a foretaste of eternal life."

Eucharistic Revival, in the words of Pope St. John Paul II, is a rediscovery of "Eucharistic Amazement" and Eucharistic Devotion.

Eucharistic Revival means that we understand deeply that every mass has a cosmic significance, and every mass is celebrated on the Altar of the world - the Altar of Ukraine and every war torn and injustice-ridden area of our world.

Eucharistic Revival is an effective catechesis of the theology and spirituality of the catholic Mass that moves the hearts, minds, souls and imaginations of the People of God.

Eucharistic Revival in our catholic schools means the cultivation of a radical fidelity to the Sunday Catholic Mass on the part of our teachers, our staff and our families.

Eucharistic Revival is a rekindling of Pope Benedict XVI's insight that every period of Church reform and effective catholic evangelization and mission throughout history can be traced to a rediscovery of the Real Presence of Jesus Christ, Body Blood, Soul and Divinity in the Holy Eucharist.²

As we celebrate the birth of Christ and his rebirth in our hearts and families at Christmas, we pray for a renewal of our faith in Christ's Eucharistic presence.

We pray that each of us could be Divine mercy instruments of bringing many, many people back to a full fidelity to the Eucharist and the Catholic Mass.

As we celebrate Christmas, we are called to be intential, compassionate, understand and listening Eucharistic missionaries.

Merry Christmas to you and your families! May the love of the Christ child and the love of the Holy Family light your remaining steps on earth and light your path to Heaven and Eternal Life.

The First Nativity Scene

The origin of the display of the Nativity dates back to the time of St. Francis of Assisi. St. Francis was concerned that people did not appreciate the gift of Christ's birth. Christmas Around the World

"Feliz Navidad" All across MEXICO, members of the Church put on Pastorelas (Shepherd's Plays) to retell the Christmas story. The Mexican Christmas season begins early in December with Las Posadas, a religious march that re-enacts the journey of Mary and Joseph. The vibrant red poinsettia flowers are also used in holiday arrangements for decoration throughout the country.

"Hyvää Joulua!" In FINLAND, many Finns visit the sauna on Christmas Eve. Families gather and listen to the national "Peace of Christmas" radio broadcast. At about 5:00 or 6:00pm, it is customary to visit the gravesites of departed family members.

"Merikurisumasu" In JAPAN, forget the Christmas turkey! Believe it or not, for many Japanese, traditional Christmas dinner is Kentucky Fried Chicken. Due to a combination of tiny Japanese ovens and a clever marketing campaign convincing locals that fried chicken is a traditional American Yuletide feast, reservations have to be made to eat at a KFC on Christmas Day. During the run-up to Christmas, Colonel Sanders statues outside KFC's Japanese outlets wear Santa gear. The chicken is served in special holiday packaging.

"Boze Narodzenie" In Poland, dinner cannot begin until the first star appears in the night sky, symbolizing the sight of the star of Bethlehem. Also, tradition dictates that the breaking of the <u>oplatek</u>— a Polish Christmas wafer— also has to happen before everyone can eat. An oplatek is a thin, tasteless wafer that is typically rectangular in shape and is often embossed with a traditional Christmas symbol, such as the Nativity or the Star of Bethlehem. Once everyone is around the table, each person will break off a piece of the wafer as they wish each other Merry Christmas, along with wishes for peace and prosperity.

"Christmas Puthuvalsara Ashamsakal" In INDIA, though only 2% of the nation's population is Christian, Christmas is a national holiday. Even non-Christians observe Christmas traditions such as lighting oil lamps along the perimeter of the home's courtyard or roof.

GREENLAND wins the award for longest preparation time of a Christmas meal. **Greenland's** traditional Christmas dish, *kiviak*, takes a full seven months to prepare. It begins with hollowing out a seal skin and stuffing it with 500 auks—a sea bird (feathers and all)—to ferment. When the holiday rolls around, it's served straight from the seal.



Christmas Fun Facts

Pope Julius I, originally proclaimed December 25 the official celebration day for Jesus' birth-day back in 350 AD.

The city of Riga, Latvia holds the claim as home to history's first decorated Christmas tree, back in 1510.

In the early 17th century, a wave of religious reform changed the way Christmas was celebrated in Europe. When Oliver Cromwell and his Puritan forces took over England in 1645, they vowed to rid England of decadence and, as part of their effort, cancelled Christmas. By popular demand, Charles II was restored to the throne and, with him, came the return of the popular holiday.

The Pilgrims, English separatists that came to America in 1620, were even more orthodox in their Puritan beliefs than Cromwell. As a result, Christmas was not a holiday in early America. From 1659 to 1681, the celebration of Christmas was actually outlawed in Boston. Anyone exhibiting the Christmas spirit was fined five shillings. That would be about \$300 in 2022 U.S. money!!

George Frederick Handel's timeless Christmas classic, "The Messiah", was first performed in Dublin, Ireland in 1742.

The idea for electric Christmas light displays were first introduced by Thomas Edison's assistant, Edward Johnson, in 1882. But it was American Ralph Morris who invented the type of lights we use today, adapting from the lights used in telephone switchboards in 1895.

Alabama was the first state to declare Christmas an official holiday, in 1836. It wasn't declared a national holiday in the United States until 1870.

The first Christmas tree at Rockefeller Center looked more like Charlie Brown's than the resplendent one today. Construction workers first placed a small, undecorated tree while working there in 1931. Two years later, another tree appeared in its place, this time draped in lights. It just kept getting bigger every year. Today, the majestic tree bears more than 25,000 twinkling lights.





Londoners and visitors alike probably know the iconic spruce that stretches to the sky in Trafalgar Square each year, but few realize it's an equally iconic holiday gift. Every year since 1947, the people of Norway donate the tree in gratitude for Britain's support for Norway during World War II.

Nine days before Christmas in 1965, two astronauts aboard the Gemini 6 told Mission Control that they saw an "unidentified flying object" about to enter Earth's atmosphere, traveling in the polar orbit from north to south. Just as things got tense, they interrupted the broadcast with "Jingle Bells," as Wally Schirra played a small harmonica accompanied by Tom Stafford shaking a handful of small sleigh bells. Because of this, "Jingle Bells" holds the world record for being the first song ever played in outer space!

It takes Christmas trees around 15 years to grow to 6-8 feet. There are approximately 30-35 million Christmas trees grown annually.

According to old English folk tales, the Devil died when Jesus was born. So, some towns developed a Christmas Eve tradition of ringing the church bells near midnight to announce the Devil's demise. In England this custom was called tolling or ringing "the Devil's knell."

The first Christmas film dates all the way back to 1898. The British film, titled *Santa Claus*, was both silent and short, telling the simple story of two children who were waiting for jolly St. Nick to visit.

During World War II, The United States Playing Card Company joined forces with American and British intelligence agencies to create a very <u>special deck of cards</u>. They distributed them as Christmas gifts, but they also helped Allied prisoners of war escape from German POW camps. When wet, individual cards peeled apart to reveal maps of escape routes.

We all know the same few handfuls of Christmas songs play at stores and on the radio in a loop all season long. But one of them has been adapted more than others. "Silent Night" earns that title, as the most-recorded Christmas song in history. It's had more than 733 different versions copyrighted.

Each year during Christmas, over 8.5 million lights are used to decorate the magical Walt Disney World.

Christmas Gifts

Christmas is a busy, magical time of year. We begin to have hustle and bustle around us. One of the first things we think of at Christmas is GIFTS or PRESENTS. What shall we get for everyone on our list or what shall we get as a present? At Christmas we receive the greatest gift of all, Jesus Christ our



Lord, born as a baby in Bethlehem. While He is the greatest gift, He comes bearing other gifts for each of us. He brings gifts that we can treasure and nurture all year long. This Advent we will look at one of these special gifts each week to help us prepare for Jesus' coming into our hearts at Christmas.



Our Gift this First Week of Advent is HOPE. For the children of Israel, it seemed as if all HOPE for the coming of the Savior that had been promised had passed. When the Christ Child was born, the gift of HOPE came with Him. All HOPE was restored in the promises of God. We receive the gift of HOPE that Christ will come into our hearts and His teachings will spread throughout the world this Christmas.



Our Gift this Second Week of Advent is JOY. The angel told the shepherds that the Good News was of GREAT JOY. The gift of JOY helps us recognize that we are blessed in every way by having Jesus in our lives. Jesus is among us to comfort and guide us at all times, even when times are hard. We continue to have Good News in our lives every day. Take JOY in knowing that God is with you.



Our Gift for the Third Week of Advent is PEACE. The angels announced the wonderful gift of PEACE to the shepherds on the first Christmas. Our world, more than ever, is in need of PEACE right now. The Peace that Jesus brings flows to each of us if we open our hearts. This PEACE allows us to be calm and know that we are in God's hands.



Our Gift for the Fourth and Final Week of Advent is LOVE. Our gift on this fourth and final week of Advent is LOVE. Jesus came as God's LOVE in human form. Jesus teaches us God's great LOVE for us and tells us to LOVE God with our whole heart and to love each other. Let us remember this great LOVE each and every day.

Roman Martyrology

Throughout the season of Advent, the Church has reflected on God's promises, so often spoken by the prophets, to send a savior to the people of Israel who would be Emmanuel, that is, God with us. In the fullness of time, those promises were fulfilled. With hearts full of joy let us listen to the proclamation of our Savior's birth.

Today, the twenty-fifth day of December, unknown ages from the time when God created the heavens and the earth and then formed man and woman in His own image.

Several thousand years after the flood, when God made the rainbow shine forth as a sign of the covenant.

Important Information for ALL Parish Volunteers

The Diocese of Rockville Centre requires all clergy, employees, and volunteers (18 yrs. or older) to participate in the Safe Environment Guidelines as established by the Charter for the Protection of Children/Young People (2002) and outlined in the Diocesan Child Protection Policy.

Note: If you already have a Virtus account (<u>www.Virtus.org</u>), have signed the Code of Conduct and attended the Class, all you need to do is initiate the updated background screening through Sterling Volunteers.

Requirements are as follows:

- 1. Attend a Virtus: Protecting God's Children class.
- 2. Undergo background screening.
- 3. Sign the Diocesan Code of Conduct.

- Begin the registration process by creating a Virtus account. The first screen requests the location: Please select Rockville Centre from the drop down list.
- Follow directions on each page.
- During the registration process you will receive a copy of the Code of Conduct and Pastoral Code of Conduct. Please sign each Code electronically.
- Select the class you wish to attend.
- Complete the background screening application provided. Background screening is conducted by Sterling Volunteers.

When you complete the registration process, you will have a Virtus account and an account with Sterling Volunteers. Your Virtus account will contain the date you signed the Codes of Conduct; date you submitted the background screening application and date you will attend Virtus. Please keep your username and the password for both your Virtus account and Sterling account as these are required to access each account.

Mark Your Calendar: Bible Study Do you want to hear God speak to you?

For most of us, prayer becomes a source of frustration as we struggle to calm our minds to find even a few minutes to pray. In our busy lives, prayer is seen as a luxury, when in reality it is essential and fortifies the foundation of our lives. Do you pray and therefore have a healthy spiritual life? The good news is that you can overcome your difficulties with prayer, and it is easier than you might think. Therefore, join me as I will be leading an eight-week series entitled **Oremus** (*In Latin it means, "Let us pray"*). If you are feeling the Lord prompting you to be a part of this bible study, mark your calendar and call the parish office to register at (631) 661-3224 Ext. 2. We want to make sure there will be enough chairs and workbooks for everyone. The seating is limited to 108 people. Over the eight weeks, the Oremus Study program will teach you the essentials of an effective and fruitful prayer life. This is what Oremus can do for you:

- Become more deeply aware of God's presence in your life
- Discover the simple yet profound steps to Catholic prayer
- Learn how to respond to God and express yourself in prayer
- Discover how to hear God's voice in Scripture, in your heart, and in ordinary moments
- Learn how to overcome frustrations, distractions, and dryness in prayer
- Grow in your relationship with God and those around you, and much more....

Every class meets from 7:30pm to 9:15pm in the Parish Center. The eight dates are: **Tuesday**, April 25, May 2, 9, 16, 23, 30, June 6 & 13. The evening will consist of an opening prayer, a song and watching an excellent 30 minute video presentation by Fr. Mark Toups, a wonderful speaker from Louisiana. Then there will be a group discussion through small sharing groups with the workbook provided, closing announcements and a closing prayer. There is no set fee for the course but a free-will offering would be graciously accepted to help defray the cost of the workbooks. We will also be using the bible during this study. If you need a Catholic bible, the owner of the Advent Religious Store in Massapequa, Sarah Ryan, will bring bibles to Oremus for purchase.

As Fr. Mark has assisted me in my own prayer life through Oremus, I know he can assist you with yours. I highly recommend Oremus. I have been blessed to have been on several retreats where Fr. Mark was my spiritual director. He is the best at what he does. Fr. Mark was ordained in 2001 and is a priest for the Diocese of Houma-Thibodaux, Louisiana. He is presently the Pastor of Our Lady of the Isle parish in Grand Isle, Louisiana. He is also Vicar General and Director of the Office of Parish Support in his diocese and an adjunct faculty member for the Institute of Priestly Formation, specializing in communications, development and spiritual direction. Fr. Mark served for several years as Chancellor of his Diocese, the Pastor of two other parishes and Director of Seminarians. He received his Masters of Divinity degree from Notre Dame Seminary in New Orleans. Fr. Mark is the author of Ascension Press resources: Oremus: A Catholic Guide to Prayer \ Rejoice! Advent Meditations with Mary \ Rejoice! Advent Meditations with Joseph. He brings a wide range of experience to this bible study.


