The estimated weekly collection needed to maintain and operate our parish buildings, ministries, programs and salaries is \$17,800.

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

We are in one of the holiest seasons of the year, the season of Lent. These six weeks before Easter are to help prepare our hearts for the great Feasts of our Redemption – Good Friday, Holy Saturday and Easter Sunday. Besides adding a 12:10 Mass during the week for Lent (Monday – Friday), our Stations of the Cross each Friday at 12:45pm and 7::30pm and the talk this Wednesday, February 21st by Kevin Connolly on the Eucharist at 7:30pm (*Great speaker, don't miss it*), I encourage you to also consider spending time with the Lord in Adoration each Tuesday. It will truly bless your soul. We have extended hours of Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament every Tuesday in the Church from 12:30pm to 7:30pm. We started this two years ago on December 14, 2021 and we have approximately 95 parishioners who come throughout the day to pray before the Lord himself, exposed on the altar, truly present in the Eucharist; body, blood, soul and divinity. What does it mean that Jesus is exposed? At 12:30pm every Tuesday, a very large host is placed into a container called a monstrance and placed onto the altar so Jesus is visible and remains there all day. Because of the 12:10pm Mass during the Lenten season, adoration will begin closer to 12:45pm but I invite all of our parishioners to be with the Lord in this way this Lent.

The church teaches that the Eucharist is the Summit and Source of the Christian's life. So, in addition to Holy Mass, Adoration is a special way to spend time with Jesus in the most intimate of ways - one on one.

Some may say, why do I have to go to Adoration, I can stay home and pray. You can pray at home but here is what Bishop Robert Barron says so beautifully about Adoration in **Catholicism**, A **Journey to the Heart of Faith**: "Adam, the first man, we hear walked in easy fellowship with God in the cool of the evening and spoke to Him as to a friend. This ordering of Adam to God meant that our first parent was effortlessly caught up in adoration. The term 'adoration' comes from the Latin adoratio, which in turn is derived from ad ora (to the mouth). To adore, therefore, is to be mouth to mouth with God, properly aligned to the divine source, breathing in God's life. When one is in the stance of adoration, the whole of one's life – mind, will, emotions, imagination, sexuality – becomes ordered and harmonized, much as the elements of a rose window arrange themselves musically around a central point." This happens when seated in prayer before the Blessed Sacrament.

When we take time to pray and gaze upon the Blessed Sacrament, we realize that the Eucharist is about humility. It is God almighty choosing to be a prisoner of love in the Eucharist for our sake. God longs for us to come to Him, sit before Him, be with Him and let Him love us. In the gospels, Jesus heals the blind. What is the blindness that exists in you and me? Sitting before the Blessed Sacrament in Adoration allows Jesus the time to surface our blindness and begin to heal it. The blindness of bias, prejudice, arrogance, lust, selfishness, self-reliance, etc. Sometimes we don't see these things in ourselves but, the more we spend time with Jesus, He opens our eyes and then we can place these before Him and allow Him to transform our hearts. St. John Vianney writes, "When we go before the Blessed Sacrament let us open our heart; our good God will open His. We shall go to Him; He will come to us, the one to ask, the other to receive. It will be like a breath passing from One to the other. What delight we find in forgetting ourselves that we may seek God."

Have a great week walking with your God. With Him you can do the unthinkable, unimaginable and forgive what you think is unforgivable.

Lent 2024

...We need our prayer to rise with greater insistence to the Father,

Dear Sisters and Brothers.

On Sunday, January 21 of this year, Pope Francis inaugurated a Year of Prayer ahead of the 2025 Jubilee Year. The Holy Father is calling on the faithful "to pray more fervently to prepare ourselves to live properly this grace-filled event and to experience the power of hope in God." This Year of Prayer, the Holy Father explained, is dedicated "to rediscovering the great value and absolute need for prayer, prayer in personal life, in the life of the Church, prayer in the world."

In response to the Holy Father's initiative, together with Bishop Barres, all the Bishops and I would like to encourage you, especially during this 2024 Season of Lent in particular, to focus on prayer. Traditionally, during this time all Christians are called to practice fasting, prayer, repentance, and almsgiving as a way of drawing us closer to God and reflecting on the meaning of Jesus' death and resurrection in anticipation of the gift of new life at Easter. All pillars of Lent complement and support each other. Customarily, fasting is a way of disciplining ourselves and expressing our repentance for our sins. By abstaining from certain foods or activities, we show our love for God and our gratitude for His mercy. Fasting also helps us to empathize with those who are less fortunate and to share our resources with them. In fact, prayer binds all these Lenten practices all together, giving them an extra strength and direction. In days to come, as we prepare for the celebration of Easter, let us take this great opportunity to renew ourselves in the life of prayer, making it not just a duty or an obligation but also as a privilege and a joy.

Prayer is a gift from God, connecting us with Him and allowing us to experience His love in our lives. It is a ground for an authentic encounter which God uses to transform us and to make us more like Christ to one another. It is also a power that God grants us to overcome sin and evil and to advance His cause in the world, especially very much needed peace as we reflect these days on the situations in Ukraine, the Holy Land, Syria, Congo, and many other troubled places.

Personal Prayer. A classic description says that prayer is "the raising of our mind and heart to God." We all might have our own experiences of prayer, and we can define prayer in our own and unique ways. However, most important is the fact that during sacred time of the year each of us should make the best effort to make a time for prayer, short or longer, in our daily lives. There are many ways in which we can engage with it during Lent. Many people might continue to follow a lectionary and other materials that provide Scripture readings and reflections for each day of Lent and be led by it to prayer. It is possible use prayer books, journals, apps, or online resources that offer different forms of prayer, such as meditation, contemplation, praise, worship, adoration, thanksgiving, and supplication. In some

places there are groups of friends, or parishioners, who join prayer meetings, retreats, or online communities that share prayer requests and support each other in prayer. Most people create a prayer space in their home or workplace that helps them to focus on God. We should all look for an opportunity to pray without distractions and practice silence or solitude as a way of listening to God and being attentive to His presence. Whatever method or style of prayer we choose, the important thing is to pray with sincerity of heart, humility, honesty, and openness. During Lent, we should pray especially for the grace of conversion, so we can be inspired to experience the need of repentance and change and be led to encounter Jesus in the Sacrament of Penance. May we all grow in a deep desire to know the Lord more intimately and to love him more fully with the hunger for his grace and a thirst for his Spirit.

Communal Prayer. Time spent in prayer is never only personal. We all know that every individual action of one person has an impact on the whole community. Together in prayer, as we walk a synodal way, we grow in a deep sense of awareness that every act of love or time of common worship can profoundly strengthen and sanctify the whole Christian community and the whole human family. We are all connected in a special way as members of the Body of Christ, and we share the same mission and vision by celebrating of the Eucharist. This is the most profound and ultimate way of prayer. At each Mass we engage personally with the Paschal Mystery of the Lord and make it our own to be led by him, through the sacrifice of the cross to the glory of his Resurrection and our life in Him. The mystery of the Cross and the mystery of love Jesus shares with us can be understood in a deeper sense through prayer. Renewing our commitment to attend the Mass every Sunday would be the best step to renew ourselves in the life of prayer.

Prayers for the World. Both the celebration of the Eucharist and our personal daily prayer nourishes our faith, strengthens our hope, and increases our charity towards others. During Lent and beyond we are called to share our gifts and resources with the world around us, especially with those who are in need. We are to take care of the poor, the oppressed and the marginalized, and are to join them in their struggle for justice and dignity in the best way we can. Every good deed is always inspired and properly executed with the assistance of our continuing prayers, making us God's instruments of peace, justice, and mercy, which is so much needed in the world today.

Dear Friends, prayer is basically a conversation with God who is waiting for us. It doesn't have to be made up of loads of words as it is all about the conversion of heart. It's not just "saying prayers", it is more about living by them, letting our heart declare our love for God and others. Let this Lent be for all of us a sacred time of our spiritual renewal in prayer so we can all become who we are supposed to be in relationship with God and with each other. Our life prayer is a statement about who we are. The future of the world depends on our prayers and begins in us. Even though our prayers do not give any extra reverence to God, thy certainly make us more revered before Him so we walk "humbly with the Lord."





Additional Lenten Mass and Stations of the Cross


During Lent, we will offer an additional Mass at 12:10pm on weekdays (Monday–Friday). We will also pray the Stations of the Cross on Fridays at 12:45pm and at 7:30pm.

Lent: Did you know?

You may have noticed a few differences in the way we pray and decorate the church during the season of Lent. These elements in our Lenten liturgies allow us to focus more on the mystery of Jesus' death and resurrection.

Liturgy:

- + During Lent, we do not sing the Gloria except during solemnities such at St Joseph (March 19). Outside of this special Mass, the next time we will sing the Gloria again at Mass will be on Holy Thursday at the Mass of the Lord's Supper.
- The Alleluia is removed from the Gospel Acclamation (prior to proclaiming the Gospel) and is replaced with a different sung verse. Together we will sing Alleluia during the





- simpler tone to reflect the season.
- + At the Penitential Act, we will be singing "Kyrie Eleison" ... and "Agnus Dei" during the fraction rite...
- + At the 11am Mass each week, we have been witnessing the spiritual journey of our RCIA. On the First Sunday of Lent, our Elect will take part in the "Rite of Sending" as he goes forth to the Rite of Election at St. Anne's church in Brentwood. On the Second Sunday of Lent, our canidate will participate in the "Call to Continuing Conversion." During the Third, Fourth & Fifth Sundays of Lent, we will witness our Elect's participation in the Three Scrutinies as he begins the final preparations for full initiation into the Church at the Easter Vigil.

Church Environment & Other Elements:

- + The décor during Lent is much simpler in order to represent the season. The use of purple and darker tones helps us focus on the subdued the period of Lent.
- + No flowers in Church during Lent. The Roman Rite is specific about the use of flowers for this penitential season. The only exceptions are on the solemnity mentioned above and on Laetare Sunday, the Fourth Sunday of Lent. Note: Flowers brought to church for funeral masses or any other purpose will be removed.
- The statues in Church will be covered starting with the Fifth Sunday of Lent. Covering the statues is a custom and a stark reminder of the significance of Lent and allows us to experience a glimpse of heavenly joy and resurrected life once the images are unveiled in time for Easter.

Some other ritual aspects that are a traditionally a part of "what we do" during Lent are:

- ... the Lenten practices of prayer, fasting and almsgiving.
- Lenten devotions such as Stations of the Cross...
- ...taking part in other spiritual offerings in the parish, such as attending Journey Cross & Crucifixion, etc. as they come up during the season...see the bulletin, our parish website at www.ollchurch.org, or our Facebook page for more information.

As we journey together through the forty days of Lent, let us enter into its spirit by anticipating the new life which comes to us through the resurrection of Jesus at Easter.



Each person is invited to come up to receive an individual Eucharistic Blessing.



Sharing the Gospel


