Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

It is no coincidence that the global inauguration of our 2025 Jubilee Year of Hope occurred on the Solemnity of the Holy Family. The Jubilee Year of Hope in this 2025 Lenten season runs through the family and fidelity to the splendors of the liberating and objective truths of Christ and the Catholic Church on Marriage and the Family.

Lenten prayer, fasting and almsgiving lead individual family members to Christ's light of conversion and repentance. Conversion and repentance, in turn, open families to a family spirit and daily chemistry animated by the Holy Spirit. Family patterns ensuared in the ruts of sin become family patterns transformed by the grooves of grace, humility, charity and the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit. The Jubilee Year of Hope runs through every family experiencing Christ's Cross: grief, tragedy, crisis, tension, alienation and transition.

Pope Francis emphasized: "All of us have received the gift and task of bringing hope wherever hope has been lost, lives broken, promises unkept, dreams shattered and hearts overwhelmed by adversity. We are called to bring hope to the weary who have no strength to carry on, the lonely oppressed by the bitterness of failure, and all those who are broken-hearted. To bring hope to the interminable, dreary days of prisoners, to the cold and dismal lodging of the poor, and to all those places descrated by war and violence. To bring hope there, to sow hope there."

The Holy Family was a refugee family and they are deeply present today to every struggling refugee family in the world to rekindle their hope. The Lenten season of the Jubilee Year of Hope reminds us that while all families are imperfect and have their problems and challenges, all families are called to grow together in holiness and a missionary spirit.

And so we heed the powerful words of St. Paul as they apply to our daily family life: "Put on, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, heartfelt compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience, bearing with one another and forgiving one another...Let the peace of Christ control your hearts...Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly." (Colossians 3:12-17)

Our Lady invites us to have a pondering heart as we contemplate God's providential design in the past, present and future of our families, especially as we begin this Lenten season in the Jubilee Year of Hope. In unity with the Holy Family, our own families are called to transform the world and history with Christ's love and the mission of mercy of the Church which He Himself founded.

In the 2025 Jubilee Year of Hope, the Church presents us with the canonizations of soon-to-be Saint Carlo Acutis (1991-2006) and Saint Piergiorgio Frassati (1900-1924). As children, teenagers and young adults, they helped Christ transform their own families with their faith and their holiness as they helped Christ transform the Church and the world to this day. Together, they are asking every young Catholic to do the same in their time, in their place and in their own family.

The 2025 Jubilee Year of Hope is a time for us and our extended families to cast the nets of Eucharistic charity throughout Long Island, understanding that the Eucharist is a "Fountain of Charity" -- a Fountain of the spiritual and corporal works of mercy, a Fountain of the Gospel of Life and a Fountain of every dimension of Catholic Social Justice teaching.

As the Successor of the Apostles on Long Island, I want to thank every Catholic family on Long Island and beyond for being Lights of Christ's Hope and Lights of Catholic evangelization to the world.

Lent, Why Not Pray the Bible... Meditate on the Bible?

So, here we are on the second Sunday of Lent -- a week and a half into the solemn season... and what have we done so far? Have we engaged in the so-called pillars of Lent: prayer, almsgiving, and fasting? If we haven't, there's still time. Although the almsgiving and fasting parts of the pillars may be straightforward and easy to understand, the prayer part may be broad and may come in several forms and ways, both private and liturgical – personal prayer, devotions, etc. Please allow me to suggest another form of prayer this Lenten season. Why not pray the Bible and meditate on the word of God? Many of you may already be familiar with Lectio Divina (literally Divine Reading). If not, this may be a good time to get acquainted and start with this practice. Consider what follows below as a beginner's quick guide and introduction. Many resources on the subject can also be found online.

Lectio Divina is way of developing a closer relationship with God by reflecting prayerfully on His words. It was first widely practiced by monks in the 6th century thanks to St. Benedict of Nursia. The practice involves reading the chosen Bible text four times in total, allowing one's self a chance to think deeply about it and respond thoughtfully. We can even imagine we're participants in the events of Scripture. The four reading times or phases are: Lectio (Reading), Meditatio (Reflection), Oratio (Prayer/Response), and Contemplatio (Rest/Contemplation):

- 1. Lectio (Reading)
- Silently and **slowly** read the chosen text then see what words or phrase seem to jump out at you
- 2. Meditatio (Reflection)

Read the verse a second time then ask yourself, "What does this mean? What is it inviting me to?"

3. Oratio (Prayer/Response).

Read the verse a third time then talk to God about it. What do you need to say to God? What is He saying to you?

4. Contemplatio (Rest/Contemplatio)

Read the verse a final time then be silent. Don't focus your mind on anything.

For our *Lectio Divina* exercise this Lent, I suggest praying and meditating on the Gospel text for the following Sunday. This way you can also prepare yourselves for that Mass. The ideal length of time spent for the practice is 20 to 30 minutes in a relaxed - not forceful - manner.

I hope this form of prayer will help make your Lenten experience more fruitful. May we all hear the word of God through the guidance of the Holy Spirit and draw us closer to God in our journey this Lent thereby deepening our relationship with Him.

Lenten Practices

March 5th - April 16th

You may notice a few differences in the way we pray and decorate the Church during the season of Lent. These elements in our Lenten liturgies allow us to focus more on the mystery of Jesus' death and resurrection.

Differences in Liturgy

- During Lent, we do not sing the Gloria except during solemnities such as St. Joseph (March 19). Outside of these special Masses, the next time we will sing the Gloria again at Mass will be on Holy Thursday at the Mass of the Lord's Supper.
- + The Alleluia is removed from the Gospel Acclamation (prior to proclaiming the Gospel) and is replaced with a different sung verse. Together we will sing Alleluia during the Easter Vigil.
- + Our liturgical music, in general, will take on a simpler, more solemn tone to reflect the season.
- + At the Penitential Act, we will be singing "Kyrie Eleison" and "Agnus Dei" during the Fraction Rite.
- + At the 11am Mass each week, we have been witnessing the spiritual journey of our OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation of Adults) candidates. On the First Sunday of Lent, our catechumens will take part in the "Rite of Sending" as they go forth to the Rite of Election at St. Anne's church in Brentwood. On the Second Sunday of Lent, our candidates will participate in the "Call to Continuing Conversion" right here in our parish. During the Third, Fourth & Fifth Sundays of Lent, we will witness our Elect's participation in the Three Scrutinies as they begin the final preparations for full initiation into the Church at the Easter Vigil.

Differences in the Church Environment

- + The décor during Lent is much simpler in order to represent the season. The use of purple and darker tones help us focus on the subdued period of Lent.
- + No flowers should be placed in Church during Lent. The Roman Rite is specific about the use of flowers for this penitential season. The only exceptions are on the solemnity mentioned above and on Laetare Sunday, the Fourth Sunday of Lent. (Note: Flowers brought to church for funeral masses will be removed following the funeral.)
- + The statues in Church will be covered starting with the Fifth Sunday of Lent. Covering the statues is a custom and a stark reminder of the significance of Lent and allows us to experience a glimpse of heavenly joy and resurrected life once the images are unveiled in time for Easter.



Differences in our Practices

- + Each year, Lent is an opportunity to renew our Christian faith, and we are encouraged to use the Three Pillars of Lent, prayer, fasting, and almsgiving as the means to grow in our relationship with God.
 - + Prayer: If you don't have a daily prayer habit, Lent is the perfect time to begin. If you do, you can add a devotion or practice that will enhance your Lenten preparations
 - + Fasting: The Church only requires that we abstain from meat every Friday in Lent and on Ash Wednesday, and that we fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, eating only one full meal plus snacks that only add up to another meal. But fasting can be much broader than that. It may look like giving up things like gossip, your favorite coffee order, or forgoing music in the car and replacing it with prayer. The goal of "offering something up for Lent" is to turn our minds to God.
 - + Almsgiving: Almsgiving reminds us of Jesus's call to serve and connects us in solidarity with our brothers and sisters in need. It traditionally refers to helping the poor financially, but by extension, we can help anyone in need by our actions, as well.
- + We can participate in Lenten devotions and spiritual offerings in the parish such as:
 - + The Stations of the Cross, taking place on Fridays during Lent, which allow us to pray and reflect upon Jesus's final hours
 - + Shroud Encounter where we will explore the mystery of the Shroud of Turin
 - + Our Parish Lenten Mission "Lent and Life as a Journey to the Promised Land" with Msgr. Charles Fink
 - + and other events as they come up during the season (see the bulletin, our parish website, or our Facebook page for more information).
- + Think about what will help you and your family focus on Lent and put something in your home that will remind you every day: a purple table cloth, a display with a crown of thorns, or holy water by your door.

There is no better time to reconnect with or deepen one's faith than Lent. During this time, we can draw closer to God as we prepare for the joyous celebration of Christ's resurrection at Easter.

During Lent, Daily Mass will be held at 8:30am & 12:10pm. Stations of the Cross will be every Friday at 12:45pm & 7:30pm.

When Do We Pray The Stations of the Cross?

We pray the Stations of the Cross at Our Lady of Lourdes twice each Friday of Lent at 12:45pm and 7:30pm.

Why Do We Pray The Stations of the Cross?

The Stations of the Cross, also known as the Way of the Cross, are a prayerful meditation on the Passion, Death, and Resurrection of Jesus. It consists of an Opening Prayer, 14 Stations, a Closing Prayer, and Blessing. The Stations are the story of how Our Lord suffered, died, and rose from the dead. There are meditations and prayers for each of the Stations that all participate in.

How Do We Pray The Stations of the Cross?

Our priests and deacons are the Presiders at the Stations. They lead us through the prayer, providing any direction that is needed. There is nothing to memorize as there are booklets at the entrances of the Church that have the meditations and prayers that are used. It is very easy to follow along. The Presiders will lead us through and make it a beautiful prayerful experience. During the prayer, the Presider will travel around the Church to each of the Stations located on the walls. The Stations will be introduced and then prayed, and we will use the booklet as our guide.

Consider praying The Stations of the Cross this Lent. They provide us an opportunity to enter more deeply into the Lenten Season by praying and meditating on the great sacrifice that Our Lord gave for each of us.

Jubilee 2025



2025 is the Jubilee Holy Year, the 2,025th anniversary of the Incarnation of our Lord, an "event of great spiritual, ecclesial, and social significance in the life of the Church." The concept of "Jubilee" has its origins in the Book of Leviticus (Chapter 25) as a special year of reconciliation, pilgrimage, and coming home.

Pope Francis has designated the 2025 Holy Year as a time to renew ourselves as "Pilgrims of Hope."

What is Liturgy All About?

The liturgy is the public prayer of the Church at the center of the Christian liturgy is the Mass. The Eucharistic celebration, where the Body and Blood of Christ are truly received is the "Source and Summit of our Christian Life". As a pilgrim, Christ himself walks alongside the disciples and reveals to them the mysteries of the Father, so that they too can say, like the disciples on the road to Emmaus, "Stay with us, for it is nearly evening and the day is almost over." (Luke 24:29).

One liturgical rite that is specific to the Jubilee year is the opening of the Holy Door. Until the last century, the Pope would symbolically initiate the demolition of the wall that kept the Holy Door bricked up on non-Jubilee years. Masons would then fully remove the brick wall to be able to open the Holy Door. Since 1950, the ceremony has changed and now the wall is dismantled beforehand and, within a solemn choral liturgy, the Pope pushes open the door from the outside, passing through it as the first pilgrim. This and the other liturgical expressions that accompany the Holy Year emphasize that the Jubilee pilgrimage is not merely an intimate, personal gesture, but is a sign of the journey of the whole people of God toward the Kingdom.

Spiritual Adoption Program March 22nd and 23rd

Everyone loves the beauty and innocence of a baby. As an expression of that love, we will begin a Spiritual Adoption Program on March 22nd and 23rd.

WHAT IS A SPIRITUAL ADOPTION?

Not all babies make it to birth. In fact, more than 4,000 babies lose their lives to abortion each day. These are the babies we are being asked to "adopt" by pledging to pray for him or her each day.

HOW DO WE SPIRITUALLY ADOPT BABIES?

We are asked to pledge to pray daily for a baby that is conceived this month that will not make it to birth. We name the child for whom we will be praying, thereby giving the baby the humanity he or she deserves. At the end of the term, on Dec 6th-7th gifts will be accepted for the baby and donated to Life Centers of Long Island.

WHO CAN SPIRITALLY ADOPT?

Babies can be "adopted" individually or by a family simply by signing up during the Spiritual Adoption Weekend.

Throughout the nine months of pregnancy there will be updates on our baby's development and reminders to keep them in our prayers.

The power of prayer is great – consider spiritually adopting an unborn baby and share the love for life that God has given us.

'During your earthly life this child which you have adopted, will be known only to God, but in the hereafter you will enjoy each others company for all eternity".
